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OBJECTIVES AND METHODOLOGY

OBJECTIVES OF THE STUDY

Emerson College Polling Center conducted a survey in Colorado to better understand the attitudes and beliefs among Hispanics living in Colorado in four key sections related to U.S. politics and voting:

- 1. News consumption and trust in media
- 2. Voting and civic attitudes
- 3. Most important issues
- 4. Partisanship and politics

Participants include both registered voters and non-registered citizens, the latter of which is understudied. The larger study will investigate these same key sections through the collection of poll and focus group data in a total of six U.S. states with significant Hispanic populations.

The study has been approved by the Institutional Review Board (IRB) at Emerson College.

METHODOLOGY

Data was collected from April 19-25, 2022 using a mixed-mode methodology of Interactive Voice Response (IVR), SMS-toweb, and online panels. Respondents were given the choice to take the survey in either Spanish or English.

The overall sample consisted of Hispanic citizens in Colorado, n=783, with a Credibility Interval (CI), similar to a poll's margin of error (MOE) of +/- 3.4 percentage points. The registered voter sample consisted of registered voters in Colorado, n=473, with a Credibility Interval (CI) similar to a poll's margin of error (MOE) of +/- 4.5 percentage points. The non-registered citizen sample consisted of non-registered citizens in Colorado, n=310, +/- 5.5 percentage points.

Data sets were weighted by region, gender, age, voter registration, and education.



KEY FINDINGS

SECTION 1: CONSUMPTION AND TRUST IN MEDIA

- Cable and network news was ranked as the most popular media source for news, followed by social media. Voters were more likely to use cable/network while non-registered citizens reported relying more on social media
- There is an education divide on media consumption: a plurality of those with a high school degree or less report social media as their top source compared to those with a technical, associate's, bachelor's, or master's degree who say cable or network news is their top source.
- Hispanics under 35 were more likely to rely on social media for news, while those over 35 rely on cable or network news.
- Voters' preferred social media platform for news has some variance with Facebook as the most popular, followed by YouTube, Twitter, and TikTok, whereas non-registered citizens more strongly use Facebook, YouTube, and TikTok; no non-registered citizens report using Twitter for news.

SECTION 2: VOTING AND CIVIC ATTITUDES

- Non-registered citizens were split on if anything can convince them to register to vote in the future; of those who said they could be convinced, being more informed was the leading aspect needed.
- The highest share of non-registered citizens who agree with the sentiment that they aren't registered because their vote won't change anything are 18-24.
- The top option for why voters decided to vote in the last election was because they have a "duty as a citizen to vote," which held the plurality with every age group except voters between the ages 18-24, who were most likely to say they vote because they "care about the issues."

SECTION 3: MOST IMPORTANT ISSUES

- Economic issues, housing, crime, and social justice issues were most commonly mentioned as the most pressing problems in respondents' communities.
- Crime is the most important issue for Hispanics without a high school diploma, housing is the most pressing problem for those with a technical or vocational degree, while the economy holds the plurality of those with an associate degree,, bachelor's, or master's degree.
- Non-registered citizens were more likely to report housing and crime as pressing problems than registered voters in Colorado.
- Men are over twice as likely to report crime as the most pressing problem facing their community than women.


SECTION 4: PARTISANSHIP AND POLITICS

- Overall, perception of both the Republican and Democratic parties was neutral among a plurality of respondents.
- Hispanic voters report more strongly aligning with the Democratic Party on issues such as abortion, immigration, and the economy, but are more split on public safety and policing.
- Those under 35 were more likely to be neutral toward the Democratic Party.


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What language would you like to take this survey in?

• A majority (58%) of respondents identified Mexico as their country of origin. Other chosen countries of origin included Spain (15%), Puerto Rico (6%), Guatemala (3%), Cuba (2%), and Columbia (2%), with no other country above 2%.



What is the most pressing problem facing your community today?



 When asked about the most pressing problem facing their communities, the most common issues given were those related to the economy (23%), housing (14%), crime (12%), social justice issues such as racism, sexism, and equality (10%), and drugs (7%). Other issues mentioned included COVID-19 (4%), healthcare (3%), immigration (3%), poverty (3%), politics (3%), education (3%), and environmental issues (2%). Ten percent (10%) said something else, and 3% said nothing.






Which of the following media sources do you most rely on for news?





How do you view the Democratic Party?




























