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OBJECTIVES AND METHODOLOGY

OBJECTIVES OF THE STUDY

Emerson College Polling Center conducted a survey in Florida to better understand the attitudes and beliefs among Hispanics living in Florida in four key sections related to U.S. politics and voting:

1. News consumption and trust in media
2. Voting and civic attitudes
3. Most important issues
4. Partisanship and politics

Participants include both registered voters and non-registered citizens, the latter of which is understudied. The larger study will investigate these same key sections through the collection of poll and focus group data in a total of six U.S. states with significant Hispanic populations.

The study has been approved by the Institutional Review Board (IRB) at Emerson College.

RESEARCH TEAM

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METHODOLOGY

Data was collected from May 17-23, 2022 using a mixed-mode methodology of Interactive Voice Response (IVR), SMS-to-web, and online panels. Respondents were given the choice to take the survey in either Spanish or English.

The overall sample consisted of Hispanic citizens in Florida, n=795, with a Credibility Interval (CI), similar to a poll's margin of error (MOE) of +/- 3.4 percentage points. The registered voter sample consisted of registered voters in Florida, n=468, with a Credibility Interval (CI) similar to a poll's margin of error (MOE) of +/- 4.5 percentage points. The non-registered citizen sample consisted of non-registered citizens in Florida, n=327, +/- 5.4 percentage points.

Data sets were weighted by region, gender, age, voter registration, and education.

KEY FINDINGS

SECTION 1: CONSUMPTION AND TRUST IN MEDIA

- Cable and network news was cited by a majority as their most relied upon news source, followed by social media.
 - Regionally, respondents in North Florida and the Orlando area were more likely to report using local news as their top source than those living in the Tampa area or those living in South Florida.
- A strong majority report they use social media sites to receive news to some degree; leading platforms include YouTube, Facebook, and Instagram.
 - Non-registered citizens were more likely to report YouTube or Instagram as their top used social media platform for news.
 - Registered voters were over three times as likely as non-registered citizens to report that they don't use social media for any of their news.

SECTION 2: VOTING AND CIVIC ATTITUDES

- Leading options on what motivated voters to turn out in the last election were fulfilling a duty as a citizen to vote, or voting for their party's candidate.
 - Older voters and Spanish-speaking respondents reported higher percentages of voting in order to vote for their party's candidate.
- Non-registered citizens that said they could be persuaded to register to vote cited different or better candidates as well as being more informed as top factors that would motivate them to become registered voters.
 - Spanish-speaking respondents were more likely to indicate they could be persuaded to register than English respondents.
- Slight pluralities of non-registered citizens disagreed with the statements that their "vote won't change anything" and that "there's no difference between Democrats and Republicans".
 - Non-registered women were more likely to agree that their vote won't change anything than men, whereas non-registered men were more likely to agree that there isn't a difference between Democrats and Republicans than women.

SECTION 3: MOST IMPORTANT ISSUES

- Economic issues were mentioned by over a third of respondents when asked about pressing problems in their communities, followed by housing, social justice, and crime.
 - Those 18-24 were most likely to mention social justice issues such as racial and income equality as their top issue.
 - Housing was mentioned as an issue more so in North Florida and South Florida than in Tampa or Orlando.
 - Crime was mentioned as an issue more so in Tampa and Orlando than in North Florida or South Florida.

SECTION 4: PARTISANSHIP AND POLITICS

- Both the Republican and Democratic parties are seen more positively than negatively among Florida Hispanics overall, though a third of voters are neutral towards each party.
 - The Democratic Party is seen most favorably by those 55 and older and those living in the Tampa area. They are seen most negatively in South Florida, and among those with a college degree or higher.
 - The Republican Party is seen most favorably by those with a college degree or higher, those living in South Florida, and those 65 and older. They are seen most negatively by registered voters, those living in North Florida, and those 55-64 years old.
- When asked which party they align with on key issues, the Republican Party was more agreed with on the economy overall and public safety/policing, while the Democratic Party was more aligned with on taxes, social spending, abortion, and immigration.
 - On the issue of the economy, those 18-24 aligned with the Republican Party more than any other age group.
 - Generally, respondents born outside of the US were more likely to align with the Republican Party or be split than those born in the US, who were more likely to align with the Democratic Party.

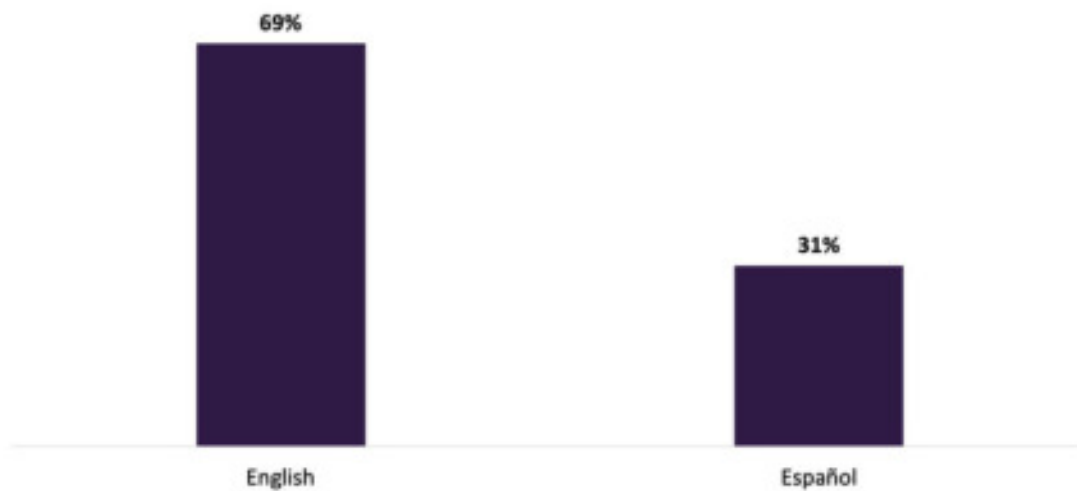

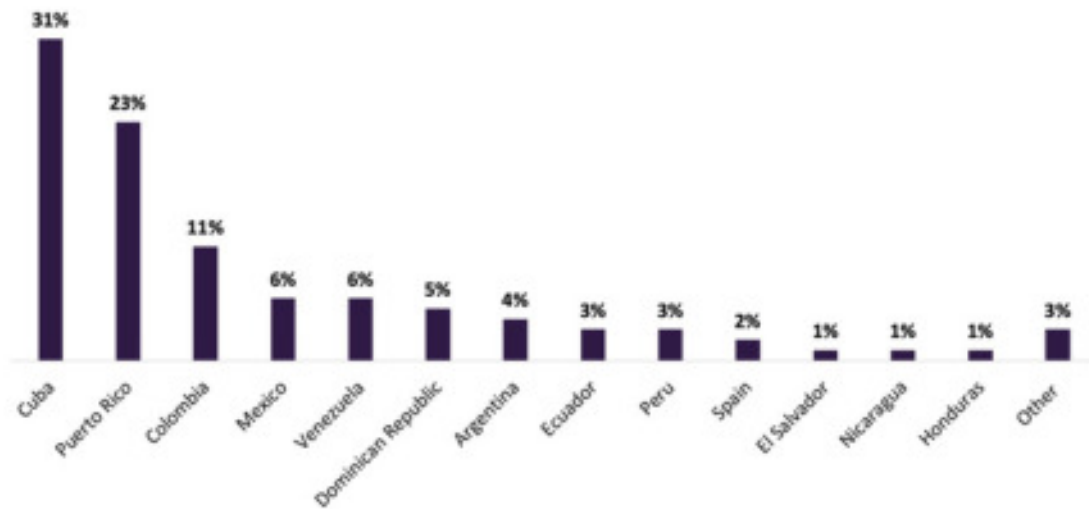

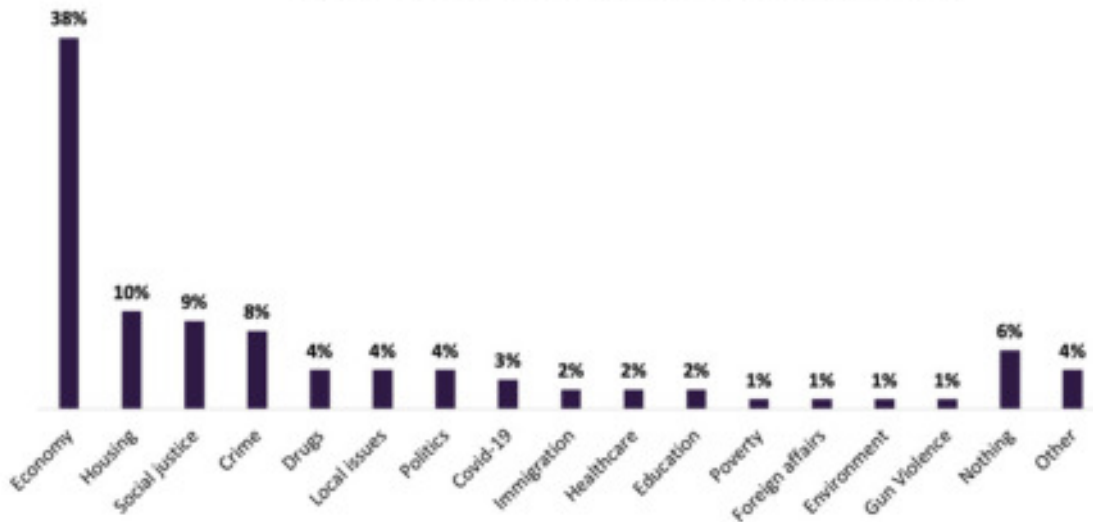

- When asked to identify an issue that was most pressing to their community today, top mentioned topics included economic issues (38%), housing (10%), social justice issues such as racism and equality (9%), crime (8%), politics (4%), drugs (4%), local issues (4%), Covid-19 (3%), immigration (2%), poverty (1%), healthcare (2%), education (3%), environment (1%), gun violence (1%), and foreign affairs (1%). Four percent (4%) said an issue not listed above, and 6% said nothing.

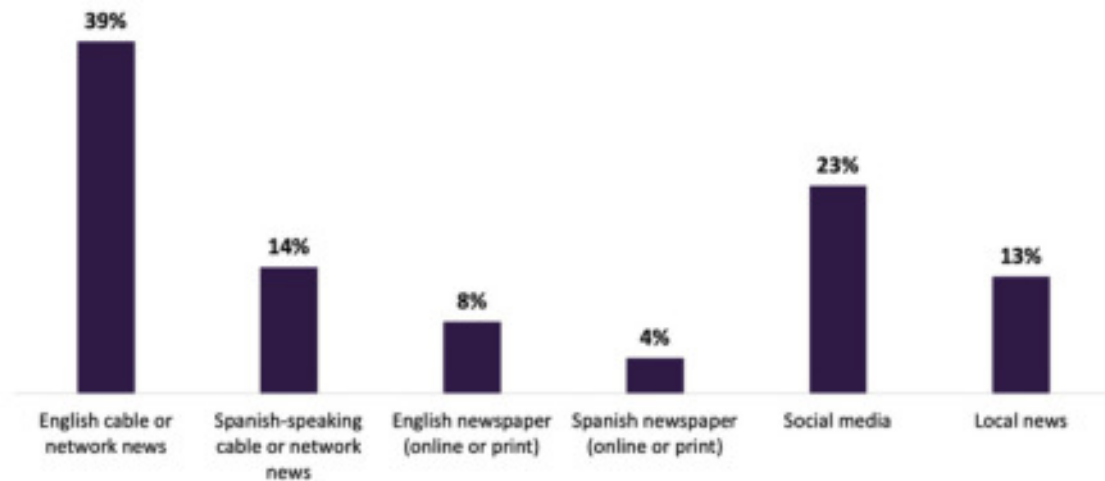

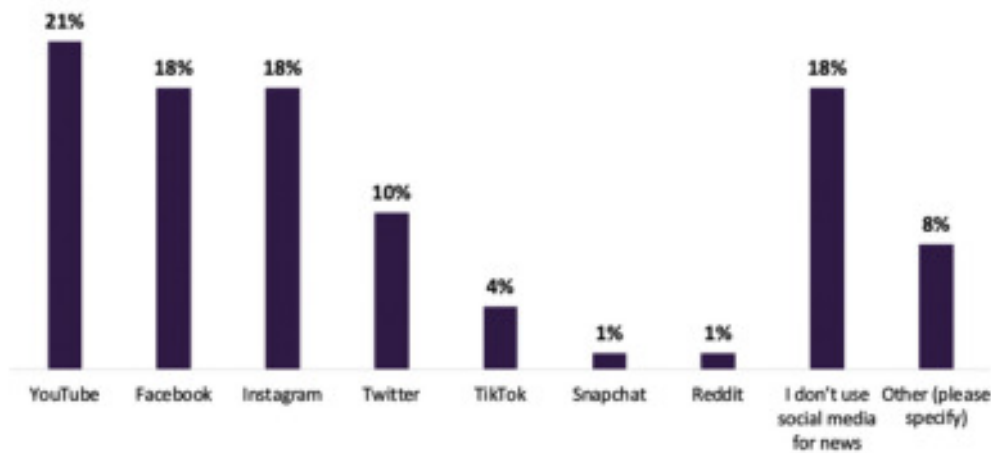

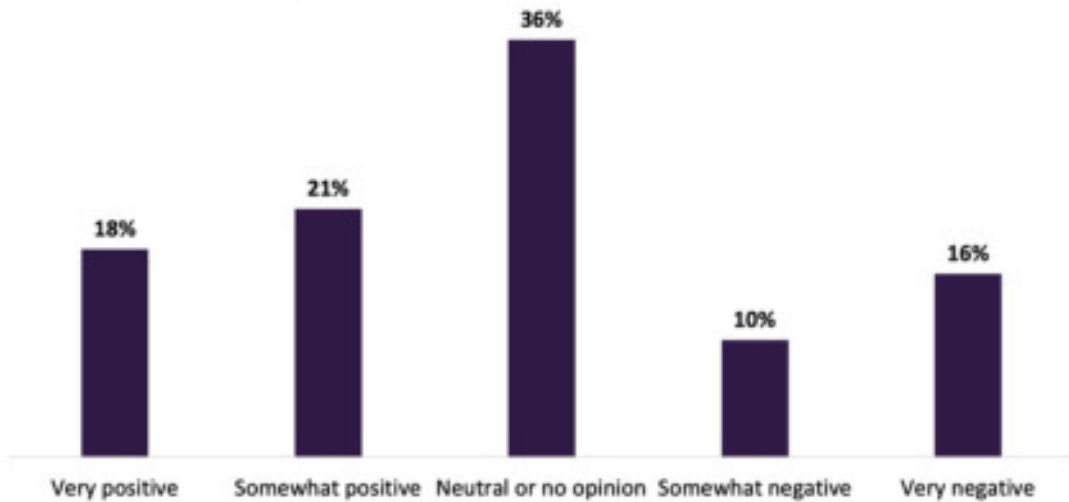

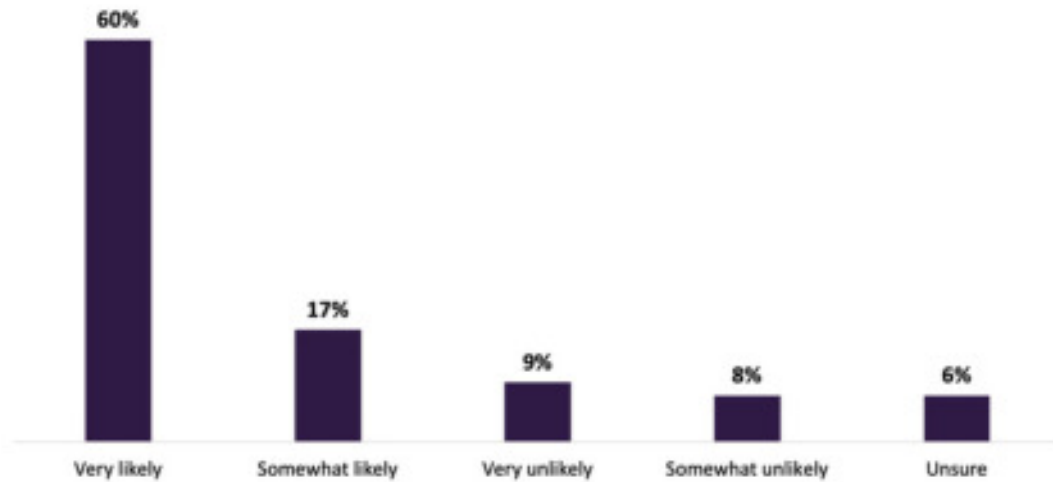

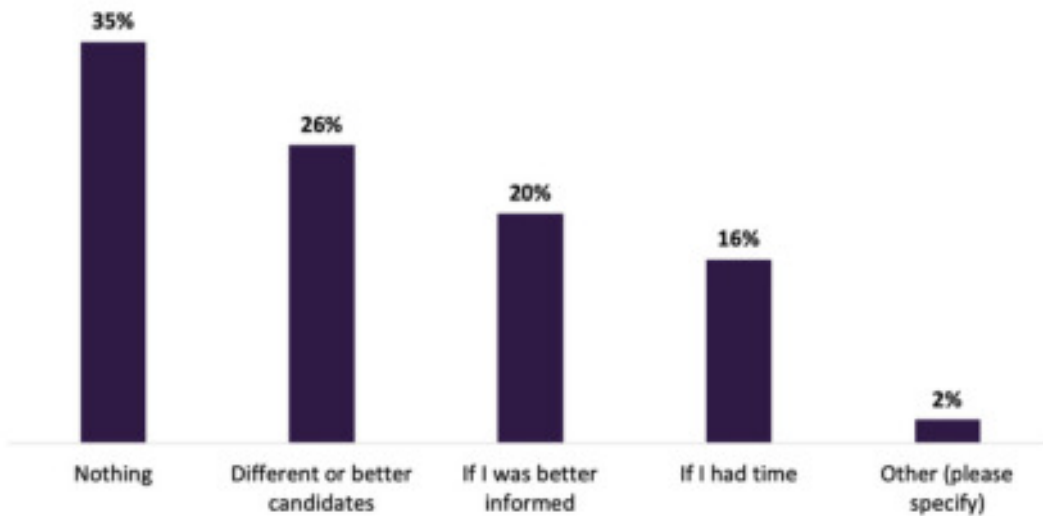

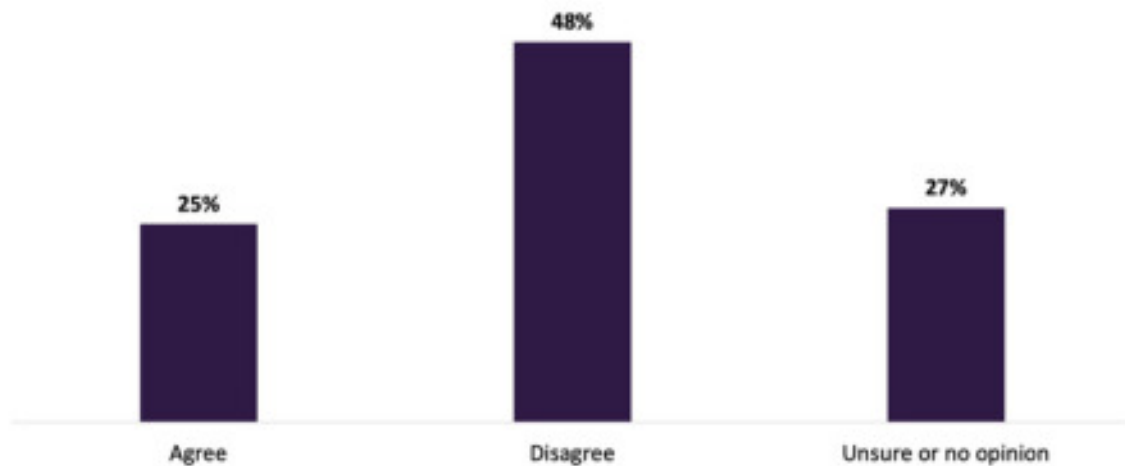

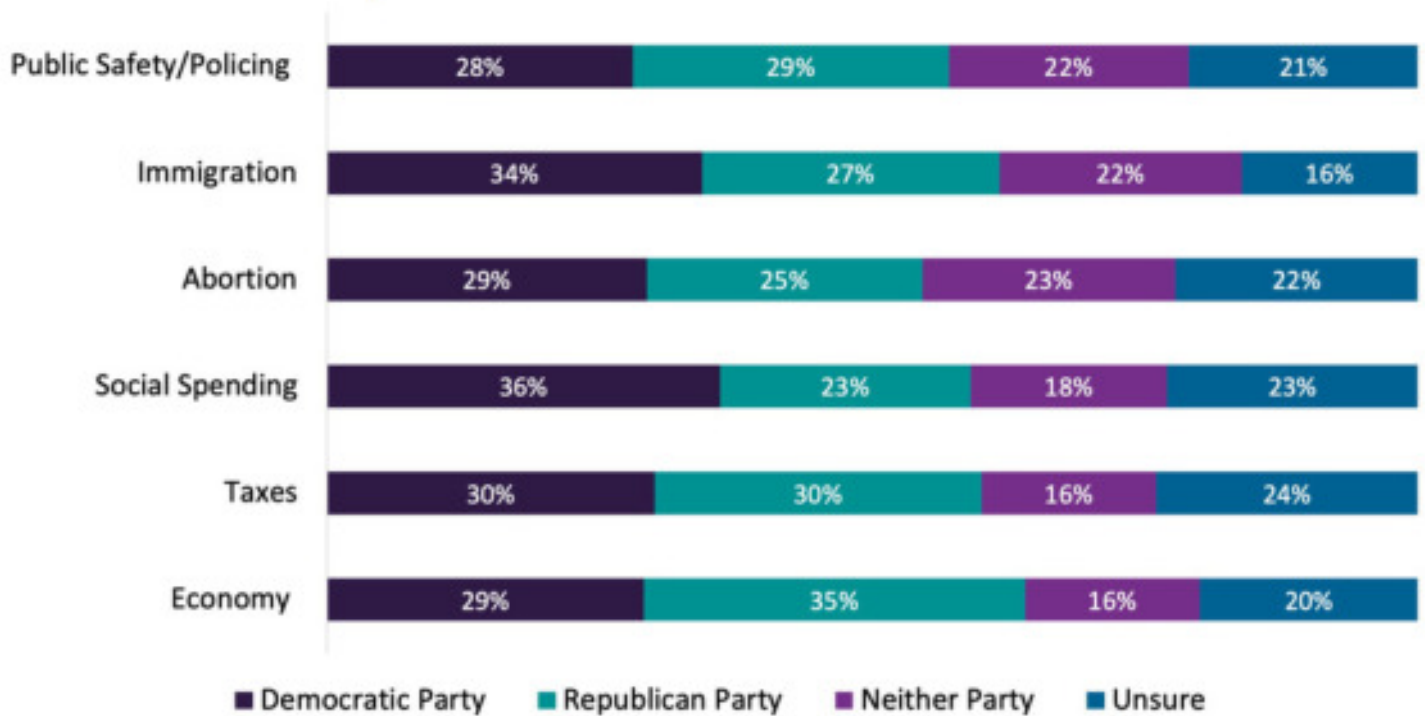

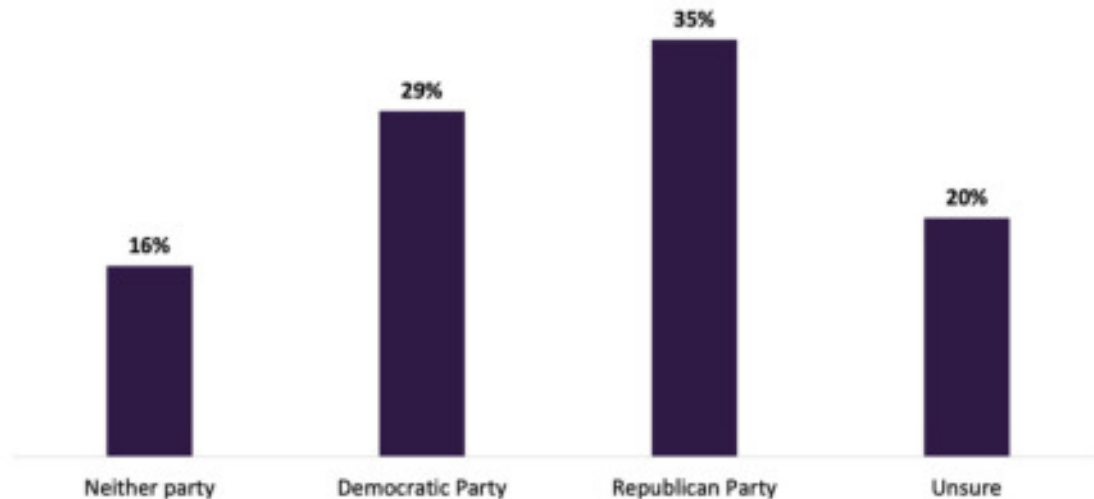


Which party most closely aligns with your views on the economy?

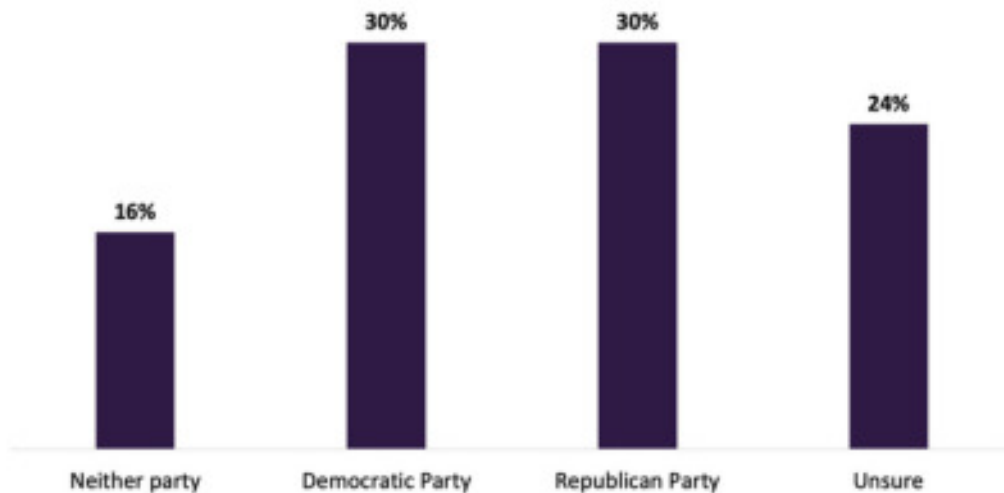

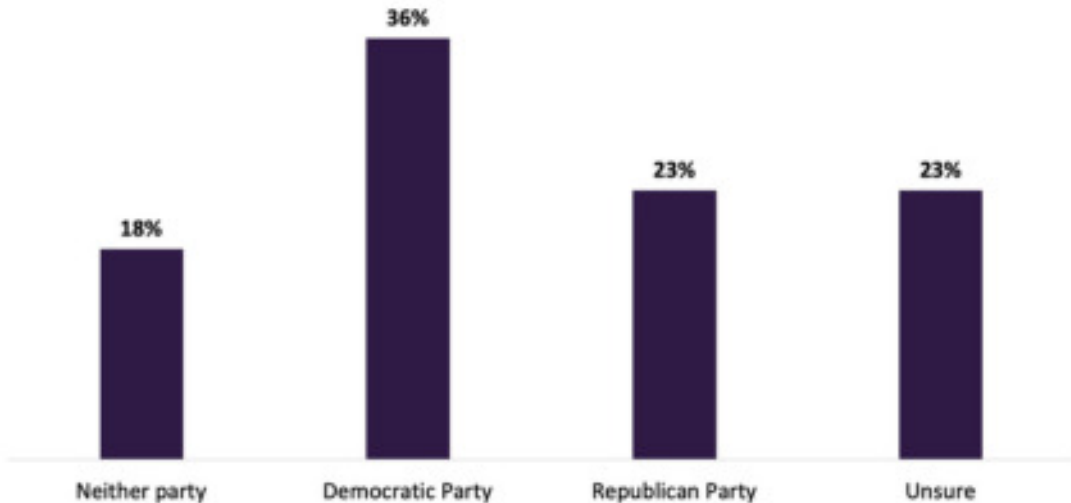

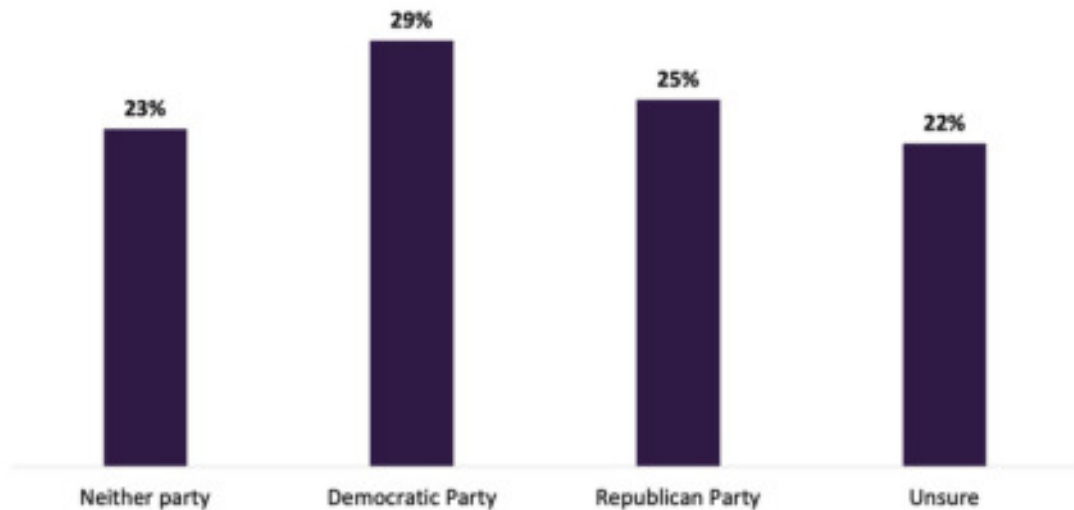

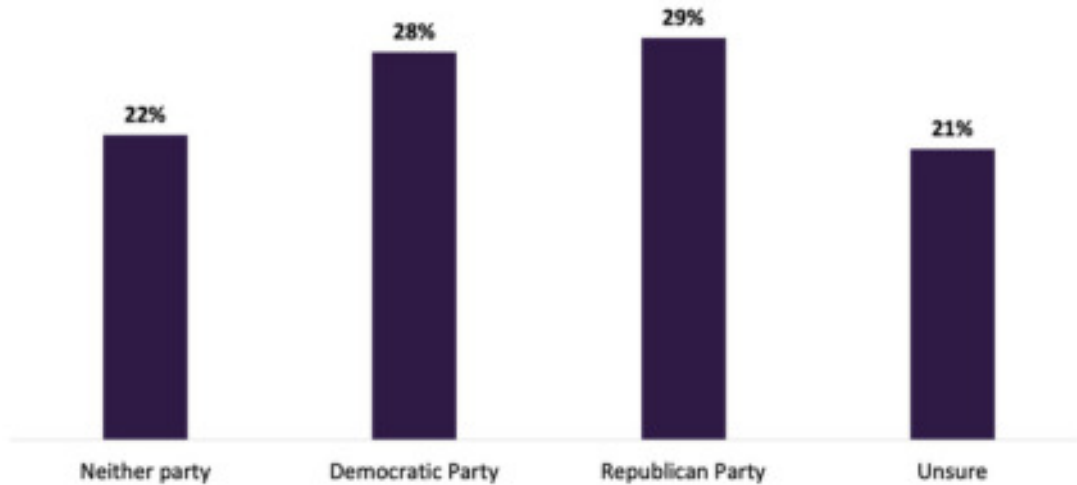

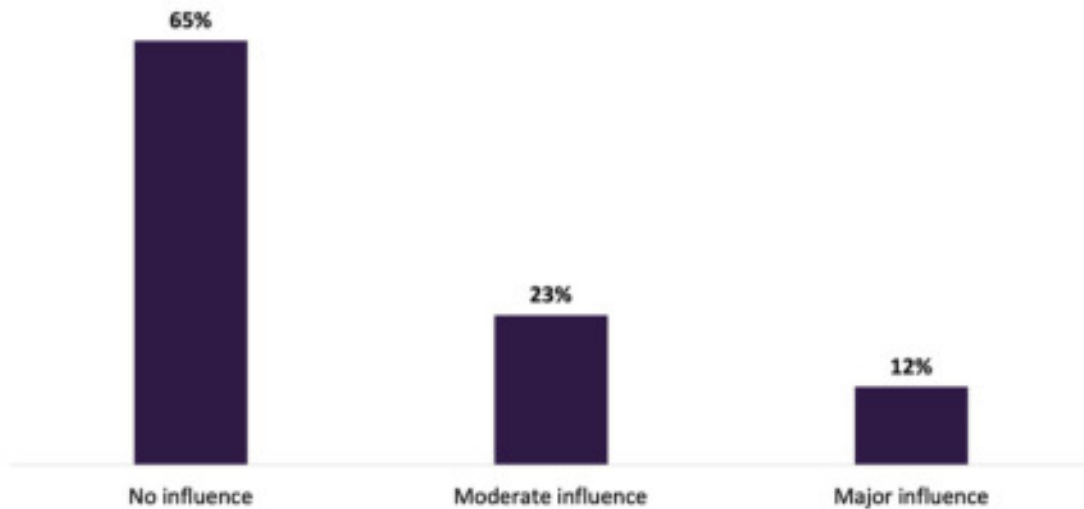
