Moderator (00:11:20): Mm-hmm, cos- rising costs, yeah.

G1: T (00:11:20): ... because, because people are getting kicked out of their homes.

Moderator (00:11:28): Okay. So, when, when we say... You say economy, what does that mean to you, the, the-

G1: T (00:11:31): Oh, housing is the part of the economy-

Moderator (00:11:33): Uh-huh.

G1: T (00:11:33):

... because, it was lot to do with the risk and inflation, and if with have another market crash, everything is going to crash again.

... with everything. I mean, not only do we have a very constrained su- su- supply chain because of the fact that we had the Coronavirus and all those sto- the stoppage that the Coronavirus have cost on all the supply chain, is now reverberating to the top.

G1: RC (00:12:49):

Okay, we're seeing that. I see that, I see that on, on a daily basis. I mean, things that will cost a \$3, the component, the chip, okay. Now there's none available and they are out there. There are some available, but they're costing \$200, \$300 per component, right? That has actually made the cost of the, uh, (laughs), the, the inflation, right?

G1: RC (00:13:10):

The cost of everything that we're seeing right now, go up. But, again, some of the things that actually exacerbated this economy situation that we have is the fact that we decided to stop the energy production in this country at the very beginning of what is it? 2021, right?

Moderator (00:13:26): Mm-hmm.

G1: RC (00:13:26):

We decided that we are no longer going to be producing our own energy. And if you think about it, everything that we have nowadays requires energy.

Moderator (00:13:35): Mm-hmm.

G1: RC (00:13:36):

I mean, we require energy for our hou- for our heating, or air conditioning. Everything requires that. Even for the water that we get from the heat, okay? All those wires that require pumps, which require electricity, everything.

Moderator (00:13:49): Right, right, okay.

G1: RC (00:13:49): So anyway so I wG1: A give somebody else a chance to speak.

Moderator (00:13:52): Thank you, yeah, yeah. So, uh, Raphael mentioned the water, what, what's the situation with the water here in Las Vegas? Any one?

G1: A (00:13:59): It's drying up.

Moderator (00:14:00): It's drying up?

G1: A (00:14:01): Badly.

Moderator (00:14:03): Mm-hmm.

G1: A (00:14:03): And I believe that most of the reason why it is, is this construction is continuing.

Moderator (00:14:08): Mm-hmm.

G1: A (00:14:08):

And they waste so much water building, and building, and eventually it's gonna dry out, and what are we gonna do then?

Moderator (00:14:14):

Mm-hmm.

G1: RC (00:14:16): You know, I moved here in 2001. Lately, the overflow was still-

Moderator (00:14:23): Mm-hmm.

#### G1: RC (00:14:23):

... was still working I 2021. I just happened to see the report today. You know, some images from NASA, and how much the lake has shrank. You know, and they say, (laughs), uh, o- on, on the, on the article that I was reading, they said, it is due to climate change. And I said, "Wait a minute. When I moved here in 2021, we had a very hot summer in Vegas and it's always been s- hot for the past 20 years, so having climate change? Does it get any hotter?" No, it continues to be the same. We just had 114 last week. Okay.

G1: V (00:15:22): Um, you know, stuff like that.

#### Moderator (00:15:22):

Ho- what, what are some of the numbers other people gave for, uh, what that, [inaudible 00:15:27] G1: V, the climate change? What are some of the numbers that you all gave? Just curious.

G1: RS (00:15:30): I gave it an eight.

Moderator (00:15:31): An eight? G1: RS (00:15:31): Mm-hmm.

Moderator (00:15:32): G1: J gave it three, no, a zero.

G1: J (00:15:35): I gave, I gave it a zero.

Moderator (00:15:35): You gave it a zero. You gave it zero.

G1: J (00:15:36): Yeah, I gave it a zero.

G1: RS (00:15:36): Wow.

Moderator (00:15:36): Okay, the other one of you?

G1: D (00:15:36): I gave it a 10.

Moderator (00:15:37): A 10?

G1: F (00:15:40): I gave it a 5.

Moderator (00:15:40): A 5. G1: T?

G1: T (00:15:41): 7.

Moderator (00:15:42): 7.

G1: A (00:15:42): 10.

Moderator (00:15:44): 10. Uh, G1: J, talk to me about your 0. You're not concerned about... It's not important to you? G1: J (00:15:46):

Well, because, I mean, you know, facts show us that, our planet was hotter 5000 years ago than it is now. This is the cycle for us to possibly even think that there's some way we can control the climate by throwing money at it, is...

Moderator (00:16:02): Mm-hmm.

G1: J (00:16:03):

So is part of why... Well, Lake Mead so low, is the corruption from the top, why are we still selling water to Arizona and California out of Lake Mead, and we are in this desperate situation.

Moderator (00:16:16): Right.

G1: RS (00:16:17): Mm-hmm.

G1: J (00:16:17): Why have we been selling water and all... And-

Moderator (00:16:19): You said corruption from the top? Who... What is that? Can you explain that?

G1: J (00:16:22): Oh, governor.

Moderator (00:16:24): Okay.

G1: J (00:16:24): And, and the governor's and, and the governs seat, all the way down.

Moderator (00:16:29): Okay.

G1: J (00:16:30): This is... The is just, you know-

Moderator (00:16:30): It's a state issue, okay.

G1: J (00:16:30):

Yeah, it sure is. Just look at the... Look at since this guy has been in office, I mean, look at Reno, look at Neva- look at Las Vegas, rising costs, and just property.... We're turning into San Francisco. That's what's happening.

Moderator (00:17:20): Mm-hmm. G1: F, you were gonna say?

G1: F (00:17:24): No, it's, it's the same thing that [inaudible 00:17:24] said earlier, just the jobs, they're not there, they're paying enough and everything else is going up.

Moderator (00:17:28): Mm-hmm, mm-hmm. G1: A, and, um, I guess, who is it that did put rising costs, inflation and rising costs, G1: A and G1: D, yeah.

G1: J (00:17:37):

I have that at nine.

Moderator (00:17:37): You have that one at 9 as well?

G1: J (00:17:38): That was my second, that was my second highest.

Moderator (00:17:41): Uh-huh. And why is that important to you G1: A, and then G1: J, you can follow. G1: A, what-

G1: A (00:17:44): Just like everyone else said-

Moderator (00:17:46): Mm-hmm.

G1: A (00:17:47): ... everything is going up. The gas-

Moderator (00:17:49): Mm-hmm.

G1: A (00:17:49): ... you need gas to put in your car to get to work.

Moderator (00:17:52): Mm-hmm.

G1: A (00:17:53): And the, the raise at work is not going up. Or if you lost your job, you have to get a new one. And they're not even hiring full time. They want to hire you on call or you're [inaudible 00:18:03]-

G1: D (00:18:02): No benefits.

G1: A (00:18:03): ... yeah, no benefits, only, only the few days out of the week.

Moderator (00:18:06): Mmh.

G1: A (00:18:07): And you got all these bills that don't stop, everything's going up. Moderator (00:18:10): Would you say the economy is going good? Or is it going bad?

G1: A (00:18:14): I think it's going bad, everything going that bad.

Moderator (00:18:17): G1: D, what about you? You think the economy-

G1: D (00:18:18): Yeah, I think it's bad.

Moderator (00:18:19): [inaudible 00:18:19]

G1: D (00:18:19): Like, I have to keep a quarter tank of gas in my car just to wait in line for gas at Costco, you know what I mean? Stuff like that. You, you can't drive around and show people Vegas, you know, and-

G1: A (00:18:30): Mm-hmm.

G1: D (00:18:30): ... just be frivolous with your gas because it's so expensive.

Moderator (00:18:34): Mm-hmm, G1: J, you give it a nine, can you talk a little about-

G1: J (00:18:37):

Well, we produce, we produce nothing in this country right now. We've... Everything we have we buy from somebody else. They've been pushing us for a while.

Moderator (00:18:47): Mm-hmm.

G1: J (00:18:47): They've changed the numbers, the math-

Moderator (00:18:49): And who are, who are they that do so.

G1: J (00:18:51):

The government has changed the numbers, the math for GDP for what we produce. So that it shows we're producing something we're not. But they change the math, why would you change the math on what, what our gross national product is, how we, how we do the math?

Moderator (00:19:08): And is that at the federal level or the state level?

... When I, I, I moved out of that place, and I didn't even pay \$4,000 while moving out. It's not... I feel like they are wasting that money, they're being very wasteful with that.

Moderator (00:35:13): So, where do you, where do you go to get your information, though? Where do you go?

G1: RS (00:35:29): No opinion.

G1: J (00:35:29): ... the marketing.

G1: RS (00:35:30): Mm.

Moderator (00:35:30):

So what about just the news though? Like, how do you consume the news, like, political news? Where do you go?

G1: J (00:35:35):

I, I consume it, usually, uh, I'll, I'll go on different websites that are, that are, are more information-based rather than, uh, corporate brand, companies, you know? Like, I don't go with ABC or CBS.

Moderator (00:38:40): Univision and Telemundo? Okay. So you, you watch it in Espaniol?

Speaker 3 (00:38:41): Yeah. Moderator (00:38:41): [foreign language 00:38:41]. Okay.

Speaker 3 (00:38:43): [foreign language 00:38:43], yeah.

Moderator (00:38:44): Okay. Okay. And do you trust the, what makes you choose Spanish over English?

Speaker 3 (00:38:48): 'Cause I like it better.

G1: RC (00:39:29): Breitbart, yeah. It's an app. Speaker 3 (00:39:29): Oh.

G1: RC (00:39:31): It was, it's actually a website.

Moderator (00:39:32): Mm.

G1: RC (00:39:32): It was founded by, uh, it's a news website founded by Andrew Breitbart-

Speaker 3 (00:39:35): Hmm.

G1: RC (00:39:35): Who, uh, at some point in time was considered a, a right winger.

Speaker 3 (00:39:42): Hmm.

G1: RC (00:39:42): So if you want to put it that way, right?

Moderator (00:39:45): Mm. But what do you like about Breitbart?

G1: RC (00:39:47): I like that they're very objective. They, they, they give you more spin, Okay?

Moderator (00:39:51): Mm-hmm.

G1: RC (00:39:51): I, I'll give you, for example, some of, some of the, [inaudible 00:39:53], something that happened very recently, right, with the, the Congress person, Ocasio Cortez.

Moderator (00:40:01): Mm-hmm.

G1: RC (00:40:02): She went inside the or outside the Supreme Court buildingModerator (00:40:06): Mm-hmm.

G1: RC (00:40:07):

... and she's pretending like she's handcuffed, right? So she's like that. She's walking. And in the mainstream media news, actually some idiots [inaudible 00:40:20] that she was being harassed [inaudible 00:40:22].

G1: J (00:40:22): Yeah, she was arrested. Yeah.

G1: RC (00:40:24):

Okay, so it's like, are you guys not... I mean, you're, so you're telling me that I cannot believe my own eyes which I see that she doesn't have handcuffs. She's not being arrested, but you hear mainstream media are putting that she's been arrested.

And I, it was just something that it was so... It was 'cause of the stress. By reading that [inaudible 00:41:00]. I'm not, okay.

G1: J (00:41:00): Yeah, they call it doomscrolling now.

G1: RC (00:41:00): Yeah, it's like forget it.

Moderator (00:41:05): Doom scrolling, what does that mean, G1: J?

G1: J (00:41:09): Doomscrolling. That's what they call it, social media scrolling.

G1: RC (00:41:12): Yeah. I, I don't have a Facebook. I don't have anything, any of the social media apps. That's it. I mean, I try to limit my consumption of news because it is actually detrimental to someone's mental health.

Moderator (00:41:29): Mm-hmm. So on Breitbart are you... Is it... Are you reading the news? Do they have videos? What's [inaudible 00:41:30]?

G1: RC (00:41:30): Um, I'm reading most of it. I, I, I read most of it.

Moderator (00:41:31): It's mainly reading. Okay.

G1: RC (00:41:32): Yes, absolutely.

Moderator (00:41:33): So it's not, you don't, not many videos.

G1: RC (00:41:36): They have videos. They have links, for example, to-

Moderator (00:41:37): Interviewer:Mm-hmm. G1: RC (00:41:37):

... for example to the tweet or they have links to the mainstream media that put in the article. But then, they give you the unfiltered version.

Moderator (00:41:46):

Ho- how much news do you all say that you get from your social media versus, uh, regular use, or like regular TV, or other platforms? Side from G1: RC 'cause G1: RC just shared he doesn't get any from social media. But others, how much news do you get from your social media versus, um, you know, what?

Speaker 3 (00:42:04): I don't.

Moderator (00:42:05): Mainstream. You don't get any from social media?

Speaker 3 (00:42:07): [inaudible 00:42:07].

G1: RS (00:42:07): What I do... I haven't heard anybody here say. As I do watch-

Speaker 3 (00:42:11): Mm.

G1: RS (00:42:11): ... a lot of, like, local YouTube, like, independent videos.

Speaker 3 (00:42:14): Mm-hmm.

G1: RS (00:42:14): Um, and I know you can't, you can't really trust all of them, but I do s- Um, like, I do have a lot of local forums, um-

Moderator (00:42:22): Mm-hmm.

G1: RS (00:42:22):

... that do things that you don't see on the news. Like, here in Vegas, there's a lot of protests, um, versus that [inaudible 00:42:28]. A lot of them were, you know, video recorded or discussed on different forums and YouTubes that you don't see on the local news. Um, and a lot of them are taken down after a day or two.

Moderator (00:42:40): Mm-hmm.

G1: RS (00:42:40):

So if you don't download them or record them yourself, you probably wouldn't even know that they existed. Um, I noticed, uh, years ago a lot of, like, uh, reports like in Mount Charleston or things like that of people boiling water, years ago already couldn't use water, that were taken down on YouTube that were placed, uh, from people that were living there, that, that posted it, recorded it. G1: RS (00:43:05): I can actually see the IP address if I wanted to. I can look them up-

G1: RS (00:43:09): ... if I need. I could, I could see who the publisher was. I could see that they're not there anymore.

Moderator (00:43:14): [inaudible 00:43:14]. For those that do use social media, say that this side of the room uses social media. Maybe G1: D you do. Which platforms do you think are more credible? Er, or, or is one more credible than the other? Are they all credible, none of them credible? I mean, how would you... What would you say, G1: V? Or do you think one is more credible than the other?

G1: V (00:43:33): No, I think they're about the same, that the competition, it's, it's out there.

Moderator (00:43:45): Mm-hmm.

G1: V (00:43:45): Well, it's just a matter of [inaudible 00:43:45]- Moderator (00:43:45): Do you trust one more than the other?

G1: J (00:44:15): That's how you get the doomscrolling.

Moderator (00:44:18): Okay. (laughing) Do you-

G1: J (00:44:18): When you start, when you start arguing with somebody-

G1: A (00:44:21): Yes.

G1: J (00:44:21): ... on a subject, your, your algorithm will now start producing-

G1: A (00:44:26): Mm-hmm.

### G1: J (00:44:27):

... arguments and feeds that will make you angry, and you will start seeing it more, and more, and more. And they're trying to entice you to, to argue some more, and that's how... That's where they come up with the doomscrolling [inaudible 00:19:431] because that's what starts showing up. The algorithm finds out what you're engaging in.

Moderator (00:44:45):

Mm. Have you all seen any, um, news on Instagram or TikTok? Do you get anything on... Like, the ones that use Instagram and TikTok, is there news that's being fed through those perhaps?

G1: T (00:45:06): Mm. [inaudible 00:45:06].

G1: V (00:45:06): Instagram sometimes.

Moderator (00:45:06): Instagram sometimes?

G1: J (00:45:06):

Listen, I though TikTok was, like, little girls.

Moderator (00:45:06): No, TikTok-

Speaker 3 (00:45:06): I don't use it.

Moderator (00:45:06): Go ahead, G1: A.

G1: A (00:45:06): TikTok, yeah, [inaudible 00:45:06].

Moderator (00:45:06): Hang on, guys.

G1: J (00:45:06): [inaudible 00:45:06]. I thought it was little girls dancing.

G1: RS (00:45:10): It used to be.

Moderator (00:45:11): G1: A's, G1: A's speaking [inaudible 00:45:11].

G1: A (00:45:11): Yeah, on TikTok, there is.

Moderator (00:45:12): There's news?

G1: A (00:45:13): There's news, and there's a lot of people that like to express how they feel. Hmm.

Moderator (00:45:18): Mm-hmm. Do you, do you engage in that? Do you [inaudible 00:45:21]?

G1: A (00:45:21): No.

Moderator (00:45:21): No. G1: A (00:45:22): Uh, I just watch, and I'll read the comments.

Mm-hmm. For me, and like that's what I read it for. And they've been... Even now, sometimes I'll still grab a Wall Street Journal, but I don't... Like, getting [inaudible 00:46:04] it's just, like, piling up.

G1: A (00:46:06): Yeah. That's, like, no need for it anymore, when you... Why pay for it when you can get it for free on your phone?

Moderator (00:46:11): [inaudible 00:46:11]. So now you get, you get, you can get the news for free on your phone?

Moderator (00:46:16): Mm-hmm.

Moderator (00:46:19): Have you ever tried to access like a newspaper on your phone and you can't access it?

Moderator (00:46:23): So what do you do?

G1: A (00:46:24): So I just go somewhere else and get the story.

Moderator (00:46:26): And get the story, yeah.

G1: J (00:46:27): Yeah, three bucks for a story from reading a journal. (laughing) That's what they want.

G1: A (00:46:28): (laughs) Yeah.

Moderator (00:46:32): And you don't, yeah.

G1: A (00:46:32): No.

Moderator (00:46:33):

So actually, I wG1: A go back to, you know, what you said about the TikTok and that there's some... You get, like, some news stories. Do, do you find that informative? Is it informative to you? [inaudible 00:46:42].

G1: A (00:46:42): Um, not really.

Moderator (00:46:43): No?

G1: A (00:46:45): No. It's just people causing problems pretty much.

Moderator (00:46:48):

Does anybody follow political parties, or political figures, or candidates, or anything on social media right now? Is anybody? Raquel says yes. What do you... Who do you follow? [inaudible 00:46:59].

G1: RS (00:46:58):

I don't follow specific, um, party or your politician, but I do... Um, I guess not on social media, um, I, I follow... Mostly, I mean, I watch on the news or TV, and then I do watch or go into certain forums a- afterwards [inaudible 00:47:21].

Moderator (00:47:21): [inaudible 00:47:21].

G1: RS (00:47:21): But I do... It's not really useful all the time, as she said. It's supposed to be people... I find a lot of people recording, giving their opinions, or what's it called?

Moderator (00:47:28): Mm-hmm.

G1: RS (00:47:29):

Their, their, their own opinions and their own outcomes, and they're really just speaking, and people are ending up-

Moderator (00:47:33): Is it... Are these people you know or just strangers?

G1: RS (00:47:35): Just strangers, random people videos.

Moderator (00:47:37):

And what... Is that TikTok or...

G1: RS (00:47:39):

It is TikTok, a lot of YouTube, TikTok, uh, and sometimes Facebook. And after a minute if it's not really something that I find is factual, I, I just really don't watch it because it's not even...

Moderator (00:47:49): Okay.

### G1: RS (00:47:50):

But I do like certain, um... Like the supreme courts, um, I try to watch that or subscribe to things like that, but it is not very often that you find a certain politician on social media.

### Moderator (00:48:00):

Okay, I'm going to move to the next section. But before I do, is there anything that, that, that you want to say about social media or news that I didn't get to before I move on? Anything? Okay, uh, I wG1: A move on to, um, the word or the, the idea of good citizen. I want you to describe what is a good citizen? What does it mean to be a good citizen? And I don't mean in the legal sense of the word, but more like what are the duties and obligations that you, that you have as a member of the society?

Moderator (00:48:35): To report crime, okay? What else?

G1: D (00:48:39): Pay your taxes.

Moderator (00:48:40): Pay your taxes?

Speaker 3 (00:48:41): Yeah.

Moderator (00:48:41): Okay, good citizen pays their taxes. What else do they do?

G1: RS (00:48:44):

How about stop and help somebody change your tire when you see them on the side of the road? [inaudible 00:48:48] money and, like, taxes and all that. When you see a person in need, just do your due diligence.

G1: T (00:48:53):

Or a guy, there was a guy who his daughter took his car. She broke it, so she taped it. And I pulled up the gas station. He's like this. He's, he's older. [inaudible 00:49:02] he was 87 years old. And I'm like, "Are you okay?" And he goes, "No. Look at my car." And I'm like, I go, "It's fixable." I'm like, "I have bungee cords at my house. I don't live too far. I'll go get 'em. I got jumper cables. We'll take care of this." And he's like, he's like, "I've been sitting on here for like 40 minutes." I'm like, like he's at a gas station. People are stopping, and nobody is helping him.

G1: RS (00:49:27): Yeah.

### G1: T (00:49:27):

It took me 15 minutes to get home, 15 to come back. It took me 10 minutes to fix this car. And then he's like, "Do you want money?" And I'm like, "I don't want money. I didn't do it for money."

Moderator (00:49:36): So helping others is important.

G1: T (00:49:37): Yeah, helping others.

Moderator (00:49:37): Yeah, G1: V?

G1: V (00:49:38): Yeah, like he said, helping others-

Moderator (00:49:39): Mm-hmm.

G1: V (00:49:39): Just common courtesy, uh, giving people their space. That's the thing-

Moderator (00:49:44): Yeah.

G1: V (00:49:45):

... about corona. Like, they give people space. Before that people were, were in line, and, like, you were like right next to each other.

G1: V (00:49:51):

At the grocery stores, it was kind of annoying.

Moderator (00:49:53): Mm-hmm.

G1: V (00:49:54): Um, that was the only good thing that that brought.

... how people were more, you know, careful with washing after themselves, you know, and stuff like that. You know, careful with washing after themselves, you know, stuff like that.

Mm-hmm. Be a good human, a good citizen. For example, if I own a bunch of property, houses, don't take advantage of the situation and rack up the rent \$600. You know, take people's situation into consideration. Be respectful.
