Hi. How are you? Come on in. Hi, everybody. Hi, welcome.

G1: M (00:00:20):

Hey.

Moderator (00:00:33):

Hi. You sit wherever you like. I'm just waiting on maybe two more people. Hi.

G1: SN (00:00:40):

Hello.

Moderator (00:00:44):

Take a seat wherever you like. We got a full house. Very good. Well, hi, everybody. My name is MODERATOR and I'm moderating this evening. Uh, my role is Moderator to make sure that we can cover all the topics that the researchers are interested in. So, um, I might be moving the discussion along, I may be stopping you, it depends. Uh, I don't know how many of you ever participate in a focus group before. If you have, kindly raise your hand. Oh, so [inaudible 00:01:13]. So okay, so you all know how this goes so that's great. Um, so again, uh, the idea is for us to sort of be having a conversation. Uh, I won't necessarily call on you. But if you wanna speak up, that would be great. I just wanna go over a couple of things first. If you could put your, um, little thing facing me so I can see it. Wonderful. Um, that's wonderful. Uh, a couple of things, we are recording tonight's session, that's so I can sit and take notes, I can only take [inaudible 00:01:38] our conversation. Uh, but that is only used for the purposes of research. We won't be putting it on the internet or anything like that. It's just for the purposes of what we do to go back and listen to what your answers are. Um, also, because of the recording, I'll need you to speak in a voice as loud as mine. Uh, otherwise, it doesn't record and then, then again, yeah, right, like I get in trouble because we're not talking and they can't understand what was said. Uh, and actually, the conversation gets really good as well, surprisingly enough. It was like we're strangers, but then all sudden, you really get to like in the conversation and we all kind of wanna jump in at once. So if you could just speak, uh, one at a time, that would be really, really great. I noticed a few are wearing masks, please keep them on. We want you to be as comfortable as possible. But just be aware of that, when you're speaking, you might have to speak up a little bit louder because of the mask. Um, I might not understand you. You will also... If you feel comfortable, if you wanna pull the mask down when you speak and put it back up again, whatever makes you most comfortable. Um, but if I have a little trouble, I might ask you to repeat because sometimes some can be very muffling, others, um, are not. Um, let's see. Oh, also, any of the information that we speak about tonight, I don't have any relationship with it. I'm an independent Moderator. And I say that because I want you to be as open and honest as possible. Don't feel like you could hurt my feelings 'cause you say something about someone or something. Uh, so I have no relationship to any of that. And also I expect us to have, uh, different experiences, uh, different feelings. And so, um, if someone says something and you feel the same way, "Hey, I feel the same way." Or maybe you say like, "You know what? My

experience is a little different." That's okay. That's the whole point here, is to kind of have that conversation.

And I'll be asking you questions to kinda unpack some of the things that you've experienced over your lifetime. Uh, we'll be here until, uh, seven o'clock. So I'll try to get, uh, you outta here as quick- quickly as possible. And I do wanna just go around the room this one time, like in an orderly fashion to introduce ourselves. Maybe tell us a little bit about yourself, a little bit about your home life, maybe what you do for a living, how long you've lived in the Atlanta, Georgia area.

Um, so I'll start. Uh, my name is MODERATOR, as I mentioned. Uh, I don't live in Atlanta. Uh, I get to travel all over the country. I'm actually from San Antonio, Texas. Uh, I am married. Um, and I have, um, one dog and one cat and no children. And this is what I do for a living. So, uh, and I've been living here for about 25 years so I really enjoy it. You go by G1: L or you by G1: L? You go by G1: L?

G1: L (00:04:02):

Uh-huh.

Moderator (00:04:02):

Okay. G1: L?

G1: L (00:04:03):

We have the same name.

Moderator (00:04:03):

Yeah, I know.

G1: L (00:04:06):

Yes. And I live in Atlanta. Um, I'm married. I have three sons. Uh, we like to go into a lot of street festivals and thrifting and art shows. And we just bought our tickets for Dragon Con. So we're looking for the Dragon Con coming Labor Day weekend.

Moderator (00:04:21):

Cool, cool. Well, thank you, G1: L, for coming. Next, we have?

G1: SN (00:04:26):

Yeah, my name is G1: SN. I've been in Atlanta since 2003. I went to school here.

Moderator (00:04:28):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SN (00:04:30):

It's kind of stuck around. It's a great city, really relaxed.

Moderator (00:04:32):

Mm.

G1: SN (00:04:32):

Um, do landscape architecture and, uh... Yeah, there you go.

Moderator (00:04:37):

Wonderful. Well, thank you for being here, G1: SN. Next, we have?

G1: CN (00:04:39):

I'm G1: CN. Um, been here about 14 years. Originally from New York by way of Puerto Rico.

Mm-hmm.

G1: CN (00:04:45):

Um, literally just came from Florida. Came straight here when I got the call.

Moderator (00:04:48):

(laughs).

G1: CN (00:04:48):

It is my first focus group. I'm currently unemployed, but I'm doing background work in the movie industry.

Moderator (00:04:54):

Oh, nice. Yeah, there's a lot of it here already.

G1: CN (00:04:56):

As far as I know. So I forgot what I wanna do with my life.

Moderator (00:04:58):

Yeah. So you were born in Puerto Rico?

G1: CN (00:05:00):

No. I was born in New York, b- by the way. My parents are Puerto Rican.

Moderator (00:05:02):

I get you. Okay, great. Thanks, G1: CN.

G1: SE (00:05:05):

Um, my name is G1: SE and I was born and raised in Atlanta. Um, and I'd live in the, the Smyrna area. So five minutes from here.

Mm-hmm.

G1: SE (00:05:13):

Yeah. Mm-hmm. And I'm in risk management so insurance. That's what I do for a living. Uh, my parents... Uh, my dad was born in Mexico. My mom was born in Honduras.

Great, great. You... Are you married? Children?

G1: SE (00:05:24):

Uh, I live with my boyfriend.

Moderator (00:05:25):

Okay. Cool. Thank you. Next?

Uh, my name is G1: CA. I live in, I live downtown Atlanta near Grant Park.

Moderator (00:05:33):

I'm sorry. You said? The... You live in what, you said?

G1: CA (00:05:36):

Um, downtown near Grant Park.

Moderator (00:05:37):

Oh, downtown. Okay.

G1: CA (00:05:38):

Mm-hmm. Um, I have two children. I am married. Um, I actually was born in San Antonio.

Moderator (00:05:43):

Ah. G1: CA (00:05:44): Mm-hmm. Um, been here since the, um, early '90s. Moderator (00:05:49): That's about the time I got there. So we switched places (laughs). Oh, good, good to see you. Thank you for coming, G1: CA. Next? G1: M (00:05:54): Hi, my name is G1: M. Moderator (00:05:54): G1: M? G1: M (00:05:54): Uh, I've been living in Atlanta since '01. Moderator (00:05:54): Mm-hmm. G1: M (00:06:01): Um, I'm an accountant by profession, that's what I'm school for but I have a few businesses, which is more lucrative than working for somebody. So... And I live with my wife, my son, and my parents. Moderator (00:06:12): Birds? What kind of birds do you have? G1: M (00:06:13): No, my parents. Moderator (00:06:14): Parents? G1: M (00:06:14): Yeah, parents. Moderator (00:06:15): Oh, I heard birds. G1: M (00:06:16): Parents. Moderator (00:06:18): I heard birds. I'm thinking you have a [inaudible 00:06:18] or some kind of fancy... G1: M (00:06:25): I have birds but, um, from a distance, you know. Moderator (00:06:25): Okay. Parents, got it. G1: M (00:06:25): Parents. Moderator (00:06:25): Sorry. See? I'm telling you, um, I can't hear. G1: M (00:06:27): Yeah.

Moderator (00:06:27):

Uh, so thank you. I might ask for those, to, to repeat everything. I apologize. I apologize. Next we have?

G1: SH (00:06:33):

G1: SH.

Moderator (00:06:34):

G1: SH with an E, not an A.

G1: SH (00:06:35):

Yeah. I'm born and raised from New York [inaudible 00:06:39].

Moderator (00:06:39):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SH (00:06:40):

Um, I came here for college. I haven't left yet.

Moderator (00:06:45):

(laughs).

G1: SH (00:06:45):

Yet 'cause it's getting so New York-ish for me, um, without that traffic. But, um, I also am in the industry. I have a son. I have one son who starts college this week. And, um, he's also in the industry. So that's why we're still here, because he's been doing it since he was eight. Um, and other than that, I do talent development and substitute teaching in everything.

Moderator (00:07:17):

Okay, okay. Well, thank you for being here. Well, we're gonna start, we're gonna... Oh, one last thing I meant to... 'Cause I forgot to mention, this is really important for those who've never done a focus group before, um, there's no right or wrong answer. Yay. Uh, it's just what you feel, what your experiences have been. Again, you might have a different experience. So please speak up. Don't feel like, you know, I have to call on you or whatever. So, um, first off, you see there's a piece of paper in front of you and you put your names on it. Maybe you have a [inaudible 00:07:42] your first name. We're gonna start off by doing a little exercise here. It's a short written exercise. It actually consists of two pages. So what I want you to look at... There's a list here of different issues. And for each one, I want you to indicate, um, how important this issue is to you on a scale from zero to 10. Where zero is not important at all and 10 is like very important. Uh, and just sort of mark those. Remember there's two pages. And then when you get done, this is the hard part, I need you to put a star by the one that's like the most important to you. Okay? You'll only be able to star one. But you can just write those, take a minute here and read those for me.

Moderator (00:08:45):

Yeah. Don't do that one yet. Just go to, just go to one and two. And we're gonna talk about that [inaudible 00:08:51]. Make sure you put a star next to the one that is the most important of all those, of those two sheets. Put a star next to the one that's the most important for you. Okay. Anybody finished? And G1: CA, just put a star. Give a start next to the one that is the most important. I know it's kinda hard. There's a lot of them so... Okay. I, I'm gonna go around the room. And this time, we'll start off with G1: SH and go around this way. Uh, if you just tell me which is the, the issue that you put the star on. G1: SH, where did you put the star?

G1: SH (00:10:20): So I put in inflation and rising cost. Moderator (00:10:21): Inflation and rising costs. Okay. G1: M? G1: M (00:10:22): I starred them all. Moderator (00:10:24): (laughs). G1: M (00:10:24): Um... Moderator (00:10:27): Yeah, pick one. G1: M (00:10:29): I'll pick one. Economy. Moderator (00:10:30): Pardon? G1: M (00:10:30): Economy. Moderator (00:10:40): Economy? Okay. And we'll talk about that in a minute. G1: CA, where did you put the star on? G1: CA (00:10:43): Um, housing cost. Moderator (00:10:45): Housing. Okay. And G1: SE? G1: SE (00:10:47): Voting rights. Moderator (00:10:48): Voting. And G1: CN? G1: CN (00:10:49): Inflation and rising cost. Moderator (00:10:51): Inflation, G1: SN? G1: SN (00:10:53): Inflation and rising cost. Moderator (00:10:54): Inflation. Okay. And G1: L? G1: L (00:10:55): Crime and public safety. Moderator (00:10:55): Crime and public safety. All right. Let's talk a little bit about... There's, so a majority of you picked, um, inflation and rising cost. So talk to me a little bit about what you're experiencing? What's going on?

G1: SH (00:11:08):

Well, in general, um, I just feel like the focus is off. Um, our country in general is super quick to rise costs we arent really taking care of our citizens and assuring that we can afford what is constantly increasing. And I just feel like as a citizen, I'm not getting a return on my investment so yeah.

Moderator (00:11:36):

You said, uh, that they're not focused on but whose they the government...

G1: SH (00:11:40):

The government, the...

Moderator (00:11:41):

Which of those? Local? State? Federal?

G1: SH (00:11:43):

I would just say both. Because, of course, our governors are responsible for go- as, a, a part of Congress to pass bills into votes amongst, you know, the people in Washington. So I just feel like, uh, it's just, it's not, it's just not working. Whatever they're doing is just not working. Moderator (00:12:05):

Not working. Okay. G1: SN, what about you? Talk a little about inflation and rising cost. What are you experiencing?

G1: SN (00:12:09):

Yeah. I mean, it's just kinda came and it's creeping up on us, and then kinda gotta... 'Cause it kinda... Actually was, it's very similar to Coronavirus. Used to be a lot of chatter about it, and then, boom. I feel like we're in a new pandemic.

Moderator (00:12:19):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SN (00:12:20):

An inflation pandemic, you know? We're almost... Our world was kind of being like manipulated to be comfortable paying more.

Moderator (00:12:27):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SN (00:12:27):

So...

Moderator (00:12:28):

Who's doing the manipulating?

G1: SN (00:12:31):

I don't know. It's the, the powers that be, you know.

Moderator (00:12:33):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SN (00:12:34):

Um, gas price is going up and the food price is going up. And then when, when stuff kinda might go down a little bit, but it won't go down to where it was before, that it'll like go, it'll like two steps forward, one steps back type stuff. Like, you know, gas price is a great example. It was at like \$4.50 a gallon or something. Now it's like three, \$3.50 a gallon which is great, but it's like the, you can't say lower gas prices. You're bringing them back to where they were. That's not to me... 'Cause they're lowering things. It almost feel like they're gonna inflate stuff and then

deflate it and then try to convince us, "Oh, yeah, we're, we're, we're lowering prices." When it's really not. It's, it's all from [inaudible 00:13:09].

Moderator (00:13:09):

And who do you think is responsible for it? 'Cause you talk about they a lot. You, you used they a lot [inaudible 00:13:17] in that.

G1: SN (00:13:16):

Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Moderator (00:13:16):

Who do you think is responsible for the rise of gas prices?

G1: SN (00:13:18):

You know, whoever's in charge of the, the major industries, who's in charge of the, of the supply chain of, of those specific like logistics.

Moderator (00:13:25):

But we'll... I... Maybe I'll ask it this way. Would you say it's corporations or government?

G1: SN (00:13:29):

I think it's both.

Moderator (00:13:30):

Both?

G1: SN (00:13:32):

Mm-hmm, mm-hmm.

Moderator (00:13:33):

Okay, okay. Uh, and G1: CN, you put also inflation and rising cost.

G1: CN (00:13:35):

Yeah, I agree. It's like we have no choice but to pay these prices because it's what it is. But then they come, like, like you said, with the gas. One week, it's \$4.50. The next week, it's \$3.50. Why did you go up to \$4.50 in the first place if you can always have kept it at \$3.50? Or whoever the, the you know, the government or the gas people or... I, I just feel like they don't have the right people negotiating. I don't know who the right people would be to negotiate these costs and stuff. Um, I know we had the issue of the prices had to go up because of the ports and the travel and the gas prices and all that. But it just doesn't sit well. Especially when you're unemployed and, and you have, uh, people you take care of, you can't afford to do certain things.

Moderator (00:14:12):

G1: CA kinda mentioned that you saw the prices, gas prices at least going down. Do you see that as an indication of things getting better or do you agree with G1: SN that it's really kind of a false...

G1: CN (00:14:22):

It's just, it's just fake.

Moderator (00:14:24):

Yeah.

G1: CN (00:14:24):

It's just like they're waiving something in front of us. Like a little kid in a candy store, they take... You take me to the store and say, "Hey, you can look but you can't touch. You can buy nothing." And that's the way I feel.

Moderator (00:14:33):

Mm-hmm.

G1: CN (00:14:34):

But I need gas to get to, to where I need to get to so I have to pay the price. Like I'm being bullied to pay this.

Moderator (00:14:39):

Mm-hmm, mm-hmm.

G1: CN (00:14:40):

'Cause there's no real other way to get around. Especially here in Georgia, it's hard to get around without a car, so.

Moderator (00:14:45):

Mm-hmm. Uh, aside from the food that, that you all mentioned, what are the costs you all see rising?

G1: SH (00:14:50):

Electricity, gas.

G1: SE (00:14:52):

Rent.

Moderator (00:14:52):

Rent?

G1: SE (00:14:53):

Rents. Yeah. Mm-hmm.

Moderator (00:14:56):

Uh, and we'll talk about housing in just a minute. But you, you think... But G1: M says, you, you you put economy. When you say economy, what, what do you mean? How does that...

G1: M (00:15:06):

First off I have something to say about in- inflation.

Moderator (00:15:08):

Mm-hmm.

G1: M (00:15:09):

I mean, it's a problem. But, um, with the rising costs increase, ri- rise in wages.

Moderator (00:15:13):

Mm-hmm.

G1: M (00:15:15):

So basically, um, it balances out. Like it's, it's a problem but it just, it's, it's manageable to me. Uh, because I think, uh, increase in wages, gas prices are going up because of geopolitical issues, the war going on. So it's supply and demand. But at the same time, um, with increase in wages, i- the inflation is balancing out. So we are used to buying a bag of chips for a dollar, making \$10 an hour. But now we're making \$13 an hour and we are worried of \$1.20.

Mm-hmm.

G1: M (00:15:46):

So I think if you do the math, I mean, coming from a math background, it bal- it's, it's an issue, but it's still manageable.

Moderator (00:15:54):

Mm-hmm.

G1: M (00:15:54):

And it's, it's... You can still control it.

Moderator (00:15:58):

What makes this issue so important to you? It's like...

G1: M (00:15:58):

It doesn't actually, because... I mean, it does. But at the same time, I mean, I have the numbers background.

Moderator (00:16:03):

Mm-hmm.

G1: M (00:16:03):

So for me, rising cost also mean rising opportunities, uh, because that's when you make more money 'cause you, you can, you can sell for more.

Moderator (00:16:12):

Mm-hmm.

G1: M (00:16:12):

Uh, so as long as you know the numbers, I mean, uh, you can still manage it. And we are not the only country that has inflation.

Moderator (00:16:20):

But, but you chose economy over all these other-

G1: M (00:16:22):

Economy overall, like I'm worried about the recession and the, and the stock market going down.

Moderator (00:16:28):

Do you think we're in a recession.

G1: M (00:16:29):

We are not in a recession, but we are close to having a recession.

Moderator (00:16:29):

Okay.

G1: M (00:16:33):

So if that happens, regardless you know, inflation in 2008. But I mean, if there's a recession, that's where it's gonna hurt a lot, a lot of people, so.

Moderator (00:16:42):

Okay. G1: SE, you mentioned housing. You wanna talk to me a little about why that seems so important to you?

G1: SE (00:16:49):

So I, um, recently moved out on my own.

Moderator (00:16:51):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SE (00:16:51):

And that was some- something back then when I was like trying to budget everything out. I had like a budget. And then when I went out there, I started looking, I, I was not in that budget, I needed to increase that budget. And it was a, like it was like a \$500 increase and it was not was I'm expecting. Um, I'm not, I don't know. And I'm renting right now. I do eventually want to own, um, but I'm just not in a position to at the moment.

Moderator (00:17:12):

And how do you think the rise in housing costs relates to the economy? Did you see the relationship there or do, or do you think it's not related to the economy? You think it's something separate? Can you talk to me...

G1: SE (00:17:25):

Um, I think it is related. But I'm not sure how I... Uh, I am not sure. But I would say that's...

Moderator (00:17:27):

Does anybody wanna comment on that?

G1: M (00:17:31):

I think it's supply and demand. We have, uh, more people trying to live versus less supply. So there has to be some kind of regulation and rent control from the government. But I mean, it's just the corporations and the, the landlords are increasing profit margin, because they are taking undue advantage of the inflation.

Moderator (00:17:52):

Okay. And I'm sorry, you said voting, right, is important. G1: CA is the one who said housing was important. So G1: CA, can you talk a little bit about housing and why that's important to you? What those is...

G1: CA (00:18:00):

Um, so I live in the City of Atlanta. So I live, I wanna say, five minutes from the Beltline. I am, um, a homeowner. So I do see the effect of everyone will... Let's just say the majority are trying to go back to live in town. So you have you're in town living. And you have so little housing and everybody trying to come in. That, obviously, they're gonna increase the rents and obviously the properties. Um, there's hardly any homes for sale and the minute they do go for sale, they're gone that same day. I mean, the, there was a house next to me that went on the market on Friday, and it's already under contract. I mean, it's unbelievable. Um...

Moderator (00:18:49):

Is there anything that can be done about this by anyone?

G1: SN (00:18:54):

Um, well... Oh, sorry.

G1: CA (00:18:57):

I think so, I think so. I mean, I think, um, I think but I don't know who, you know. I don't know who. And it worries me because once the pr- once the hou- the houses are going up and so rent isn't... Rent for now is at \$2,400 to almost \$3,000, \$3,200, \$3,500, depending on the little, on the area that you're at. It worries me because my parents, um, they're homeowners, they're both retired. Um, so in the neighborhood that I live, you have a lot of, um, retired.

So I worry about that per se and the property values going up to where they won't be able to pay the taxes, because they're both on a fixed income. And so, you know, I look at it and I'm like, "Okay, what was, you know, what are you paying this year? What are you gonna pay next year?" Um, and it's all based on property values. And mind you, they haven't done any work to their house but their property value is going up because everybody is building all around it.

Moderator (00:20:00):

Mm-hmm.

G1: CA (00:20:00):

You know, you have people buying houses that were built in the '60s, '70s for \$499,000, half a million and you're like, "What the heck?" So this is downtown. I mean, this is literally Grant Park. And it's unbelievable.

G1: SE (00:20:14):

I have something to say on that. I have a friend in the Grant Park area and the, um, the house she used to live in, um, right up boulevard.

Moderator (00:20:23):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SE (00:20:23):

Um, uh, the owner bought it for like \$100,000 some years ago. And then she sold it for \$500,000. And all they did is demolish it and built like a million dollar home right on that same area.

Moderator (00:20:34):

Right. Oh, yeah, yeah.

G1: SE (00:20:35):

Yeah.

Moderator (00:20:35):

Um, yeah.

G1: SE (00:20:35):

And then all of the neighbors-... But then the house across the street is like, uh, just run down. Basically, like crack house across the street from the million dollar home.

G1: CA (00:20:44):

Yeah, yeah. I mean, it's, it's unbelievable. I mean, my house is... You know, I haven't done any work on it. Mind you, my parents haven't done any work on it. But houses all around us are going for half a million, maybe a little bit more.

Moderator (00:20:57):

Yeah. I think somebody talked about... Did someone say, mention rent control? So many [inaudible 00:21:01]. Yeah. But... So how, how do you all feel about rent control? What does that... How does that make you feel?

G1: SN (00:21:05):

I'm negative against it. I don't think it's a good idea. I think we live in a free market economy. That's the, that's what... It's the hallmarks of the United States of America. If someone's charging a price, you don't wanna pay it, you don't pay it, you know? A landlord can increase the rent by 20%, and that's what's going on. And you have the option to move out. Move out. And he, uh, think... If he thinks he can get that money, let him get the money..

I mean, it's like people that cry about rent control also are people that are kind of... I feel like they're envious of people that own businesses and they, and they, they wanna be in that kinda dynamic. So it's like I own a property, I do own a rental property. I haven't increased my tenant's rent just because I, I create such a good dynamic of, of my costs, my costs to, to expenses. And... But you know? Maybe in a year if they renew, I might go up 10%, you know. We're talking, you know, a couple hundreds bucks. It's like... It's, it's just... It's natural. Like, you know, my property taxes are going up. And that's a whole other scam in my mind.

Yeah.

G1: SN (00:22:06):

Because I feel like, I feel like, it's like it's like the government's just sucking money. This virtual number of what they can value your property at and then just tax you on it. And you're forced to pay it. You have no... There's no like remediation to it. I have appealed my property taxes every, every couple of years to mitigate that. But, um, even then, you know, this, the, the assessor can just be like... And it happened to me one time.

Mm-hmm.

G1: SN (00:22:31):

I think they got tired and they, they're like, "Well, no. We think it's this, it's gonna be that." Moderator (00:22:35):

Yeah, yeah.

G1: SN (00:22:36):

You need to get to the Supreme Court.

Moderator (00:22:37):

Um, G1: SE, you said voting rights. I'm sorry. Um, can you talk to me a little bit about what, what makes that issue so important to you?

G1: SE (00:22:45):

Um, I think everybody, uh, they have that right. I think everybody should have the, the option. I mean, I, I'm, I'm very about like, "Hey, voting is your voice and everyone should go out there and do it." But I have experienced... Well, not experienced. I have gone to different places in, you know, in, uh, definitely South Atlanta, Southwest Atlanta, where, um, I grew up in Cobb County. So I go up to, in Powder Springs and go up and vote where I'm registered. And I'm in and out about five minutes. You go to the predominantly Black areas, there's two machines. And the line, three hours, three, four hours long. And I have gone to those, um, locations, those voting sites and I have handed out water, snacks. And I'm like, "Stay in line." I know this is unfair but voting for the correct person, I would hope would, would change that [inaudible 00:23:35]. Moderator (00:23:35):

Has it always been this way or...

G1: SE (00:23:38):

I don't know if it's always been this way. But I started getting involved in 2016. Um, and just going to the, just all the elections. Um, the governor election, uh, with Kemp and Stacey Abrams. I mean, it was just...

Moderator (00:23:49):

What made you decide... What made you feel like you needed to act?

G1: SE (00:23:52):

Um, just... I mean, I kept posting about it on social media. I posted that I wanted to actually go out there and just see, and see what was going on. I saw the videos and saw everything and I wanted to see with my own eyes. So I, um, did like, I've, I had people on social media cash app me money donations to go get snacks and drinks and stuff to go to these voting sites. And just seeing with my own eyes is the predominantly Black areas in like very rough parts of Atlanta in one machine, two machines. And people in lines in the heat or in the rain, in the cold. Whatever the weather is. And it was just so crazy to me that earlier that morning, I was in Cobb County, and they were treating me like, "Oh, like this royalty." And in and out, eight machines in a huge

building. And here I am and they don't have that same opportunity. Why? Because it's a poor area. And I don't know that they know that their votes gonna go elsewhere. I, I don't know. Moderator (00:24:43):

Mm-hmm.

G1: CN (00:24:44):

I wanna piggyback on that. I live on the south side. I guess it's considered south side, by the airport. And they rezoned where I live. I was in Fulton County now South Fulton. So when it became Ful- voting time, they changed my center and we didn't get notified until the week before voting you know, where we do the vote. So people didn't check their mail. Like some... You know, junk mail comes, but when you... You get tired of all the voting stuff. If you didn't read it, you wouldn't have known your center had changed. And, you know, and it was literally my house is here. I used to vote on this side of the street.

Now I vote on this side of the street because they, they change from Fulton County to South Fulton. And it was so confusing and so many people never got to vote. 'Cause once they got their transportation... 'Cause, you know, there's no, there's no bus out there, whatever. If you don't have a car, you don't get a ride, you can't get there. Once they got the ride, they couldn't get another ride to get them to where they were going. It was a headache in the last election. Moderator (00:25:38):

And finally, G1: L, you mentioned crime and, um, public safety, I think.

G1: L (00:25:43):

Mm-hmm.

Moderator (00:25:44):

Why is... What, what, what is it about that, that still rings so important to you?

G1: L (00:25:47):

Yeah, my husband and I have, um, a couple of property. We own one in Douglas County and then we own one in Fulton County. The one in Fulton County is an up and coming, slowly but surely, regentrified neighborhood. And I did not know things were as bad as they were in Fulton County. I saw it on the news but I saw it from a distance, from Douglas County. I was like, "Wow, they're really shooting a lot in Fulton County."

Moderator (00:26:19):

Mm-hmm.

G1: L (00:26:20):

The gunshots, the ambulances, the litter. It's just, I don't know. Um, I think Andre Dickens, the mayor of Atlanta, has a really good plan to, uh, deal with the crime and the violence and the gun control. But it's just going on everywhere. All across the cities, all across the United States, there's been a surge in violence and crime. So I was just surprised by coming into Fulton County, a little surprised by... I mean, in two properties. Like, like they said, you own, you own one property and it's in Cobb County or Douglas County, totally different experience than anywhere where there's people of color, you know?

'Cause my, my husband and I are both of Hispanic origin. He is, um, Puerto Rican, I have a Panamanian background. And so issue's atrocious. Like the, somebody mentioned, um, the government services. Like if I need to go to the government service like DMV or Social Security Office, I don't do it in Fulton County 'cause the line is wrapping around the building,

there's no parking. I'm just like, wow. You know, you can see the disparities between race and class and socio-economic background and protection, poverty. You can see it so clearly. Moderator (00:27:42):

Mm-hmm. Um, I wanna talk a little bit about... Well, one last question before we move on to the next session. Was there anything on here that, um, that was missing? Um, maybe you put it as a 10, that you were torn between two because, you know, you had to just pick one and, but you still feel pretty strongly about another, about that second issue? Is there anything missing that you can think of?

G1: SE (00:28:09):

Um, I would say the other... I was torn between voting rights and abortion.

Moderator (00:28:13):

Uh-huh.

G1: SE (00:28:14):

Um, just I don't think the government should be involved in any decision I make with my body. Moderator (00:28:19):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SE (00:28:19):

And that's...

Moderator (00:28:20):

How do others feel about that?

G1: SN (00:28:22):

I just don't, I don't think abortion should be used as birth control.

G1: SE (00:28:24):

I agree.

G1: L (00:28:25):

I agree, too. I agree. Oh, my God, I'm so glad to hear you say that. And I'm a woman. And I just feel like... I don't know. I think we should look at education with women. Um, exposure to birth control. 'Cause there's more ways to not have babies than there is to have babies So we...

G1: SE (00:28:46):

I agree with that, too. I agree with that.

G1: L (00:28:50):

Yeah. It's just like...

G1: SE (00:28:51):

I mean, I mean, I, I am pro choice all the way but I don't agree that it should be birth control absolutely.

G1: SN (00:28:55):

It might be good, I think, if they, if they desensitize abortion to make it like, "Oh, just get an abortion." Then it's just gonna be like, it's gonna make like women, younger girls to feel like, "Oh, that's normal." Like it's gonna like...

G1: SE (00:29:06):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SN (00:29:07):

And I don't think it's normal to have to get an abortion. That's just me. It's exacerbating the circumstances. That's like, "Okay, I need to get an abortion."

G1: SE (00:29:15):

Yeah.

G1: SN (00:29:15):

So it just becomes too like, like just, just like a commonplace word, then, then it's gonna, it's just gonna desensitize sense. I don't know. I'm just very polarized about the topic.

G1: SE (00:29:24):

Mm-hmm.

G1: CN (00:29:25):

I just say it becomes the norm, becomes the norm.

G1: SE (00:29:27):

Yeah.

G1: CN (00:29:27):

Yeah, yeah.

G1: SE (00:29:29):

It's a misconception.

G1: CN (00:29:30):

Big decision for [inaudible 00:29:32].

G1: SH (00:29:33):

Agreeing with her. I think it's a misconception as far as like people believing that it is, um, for birth control purposes. I primarily support it for medical purposes. You know what I mean? And for those who are raped.

G1: SN (00:29:51):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SH (00:29:52):

That's essential. But agreeing with education. Education is so primitive. And these children nowadays do not get education.

G1: SN (00:30:02):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SH (00:30:02):

Even if you were to slide it in the school system, some, not all.

Moderator (00:30:06):

What about immigration? Uh, some of the things [inaudible 00:30:10] immigration. What's your [inaudible 00:30:12] to that?

G1: CN (00:30:12):

Well, to me, immigration is important.

Moderator (00:30:13):

Okay.

G1: CN (00:30:15):

Um, I have a very good friend who's here illegally. Came here legally, was misinformed by some lawyers. Um, lost their privileges to be able to be able to get a green card through errors that were being told to her for her being naive, not knowing. This... I mean, this is going back 20, 30 years ago.

Moderator (00:30:33):

Mm-hmm.

G1: CN (00:30:33):

She was misinformed. And she did some stuff that she thought she was supposed to do so she can get her paperwork and it was classified as fraud on the documents. And so now, she's been banned for life to get a green card or any type of information to be, to be able to stay here. So that's important to me. 'Cause, uh, she's, like she's made it. She's got two kids, her husband got his green card already. Her kids were born here. I mean, they pay their taxes, they do everything and she's a good person.

And because someone misinformed her when she was 20 years old, and she's 60 years old now, you know, she's been blacklisted. I mean, and she spent thousands of dollars on lawyers to try to get her paperwork out. I mean, she still has a social security card that she can use 'cause she came here legally. But now, unfortunately, she's here illegally. And it scares me every day that she's gonna get caught and sent back.

G1: CA (00:31:28):

The backlog is, uh, it's insane. The backlog for immigration is just... You're talking about somebody waiting for, um, legal, to be legal, you know, become legal. You're talking about a 10, 15, 20, 30 year wait.

G1: CN (00:31:46):

Yeah.

G1: CA (00:31:48):

That's, that's crazy. Like...

G1: CN (00:31:51):

And, and... Excuse me. I'm not saying give it to the criminals. We know who the criminals are.

G1: CA (00:31:54):

Mm-hmm. Yeah.

G1: CN (00:31:54):

People come here doing legal stuff and get it, I get it.

G1: CA (00:31:57):

Yeah.

G1: CN (00:31:57):

But if... Like I met someone on one of my movie sets, 15 years and five months, it took him to get a green card.

G1: SN (00:32:04):

Wow.

G1: CA (00:32:05):

Yeah.

G1: SN (00:32:05):

Mm-hmm.

G1: CN (00:32:06):

And it was... He said it was like the... He got it because of the pandemic. He said... I think he said that was like... For him, the pandemic was his glory because he was able to get a green card.

G1: CA (00:32:16):

Yeah, yeah.

G1: CN (00:32:16):

He thinks that if it hadn't been for the pandemic, he was probably waiting another 10 years before he get it.

Moderator (00:32:20):

Where is he from? If you don't mind me asking.

G1: CN (00:32:21):

Mexico.

Moderator (00:32:22):

Wow.

G1: SE (00:32:22):

I have several friends with DACA. Like they're, they're through DACA. They do their taxes, they do everything we do, they're just with DACA. I'm just watching them renew. The, the whole renewal process, it's jus, it's just money.

Moderator (00:32:33):

Yeah. They pay a lot of money.

G1: SE (00:32:34):

It's just money. And, and I'm like, "You could pay that?" Like... And sometimes I'm like, "You... Do you see this..." Like, "Do you really wanna be here? Do you see this place?" Like, "Do you see what we're doing [inaudible 00:32:42] here?"

G1: CN (00:32:42):

But... Like... Well, I know where my girlfriend is from. And, and it's, you know, it's... For her, she could never go back.

G1: SE (00:32:48):

Right? Of co-... Yeah.

G1: CN (00:32:49):

So for her, she's like, "I'm gonna do what I have to do to stay here."

Moderator (00:32:52):

Well, I wanna move on to the next section and wanna talk a little bit about, you know, these issues that we've been discussing. But I wanna talk about where you learn about these issues and concerns that you've expressed. So, uh, I guess the first question is, what would you say is the main... We're not going through the same... We're not looking through that.

G1: SN (00:33:09):

Oh.

Moderator (00:33:09):

Yeah, sorry. It's just me talking. Um, what would you say is the main source, uh, your main source of, about getting information about these issues right now? Like...

G1: M (00:33:21):

Phone.

Moderator (00:33:21):

Your phone? Okay.

G1: SN (00:33:22):

Uh, news.

G1: CN (00:33:23):

So sad, the news. And I hate to say it's sad.

Moderator (00:33:25):

The news? G1: CN (00:33:26): Yeah. It's depressing to watch the news but you have to stay on top of what's going on. Moderator (00:33:30): Okay. Uh, G1: M, you say your phone. Uh, so what do you mean by that? G1: M (00:33:34): Like news, news apps. Apple News. Moderator (00:33:36): Okav. G1: M (00:33:36): CNN. G1: CA (00:33:39): Articles. G1: M (00:33:40): FOX 5. Moderator (00:33:41): Okay. Now, are you watching... Are you getting it like, uh, notifications? Or do you go to the apps? G1: M (00:33:47): I mean, when I'm bored, I go. But when I get notifications, I look into it. So mostly notification but sometimes, I am going, going surfing, I'll go to the apps themselves. Moderator (00:33:58): To the news apps themselves? G1: M (00:34:01): Yes. Uh, just to be knowing, you know, just, um, information, what's going on. Moderator (00:34:08): Okay. Um, G1: SE, you said you look at... uh, you look through feeds. What do you mean by that? G1: SE (00:34:10): Like articles. Like if I see something that gets... grabs my attention from, from any, like any other news article. Moderator (00:34:15): And where are you catching the... Are you going to... G1: SE (00:34:17): Social media. Moderator (00:34:17): Social media? G1: SE (00:34:18): Mm-hmm. So like Facebook, Instagram. Moderator (00:34:20):

Facebook and Instagram?

G1: SE (00:34:21):

Moderator (00:34:21):

Mm-hmm.

And is that stuff that your friends have posted or is this stuff that's actually content from the stations or the news?

G1: SE (00:34:27):

Um, content from the st- like there are, may come with a sponsored ads.

Moderator (00:34:30):

Okay.

G1: SE (00:34:30):

Or, or even stuff that people share.

Moderator (00:34:33):

Mm-hmm. Okay, okay.

G1: M (00:34:34):

Basically, I mean, you would know if you sign up for certain groups or something on social media, then you'll get news from that. So you like CNN and they'll start throwing on that or on your, on your Instagram or Facebook page.

Moderator (00:34:46):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SN (00:34:47):

We're probably gonna see a lot of political stuff now. Our phones are listening.

G1: SE (00:34:50):

I know.

G1: L (00:34:51):

Right.

Moderator (00:34:51):

So your phones are listening?

G1: SN (00:34:52):

Oh, yeah.

Moderator (00:34:52):

Yeah, yeah.

G1: SN (00:34:54):

They're like watching.

G1: M (00:34:57):

They're watching while listening. Um...

G1: SN (00:34:58):

They watch you, too. Yeah. Huh.

Moderator (00:35:01):

And you said news, G1: SN.

G1: SN (00:35:02):

Yeah, yeah.

Moderator (00:35:03):

Like where, where are you getting... Um, when you say news, what does that mean to you? G1: SN (00:35:06):

Uh, I like watching headline news in the morning. It's my morning routine. Coffee, headline news, uh, just kind of start the day. All the top headlines. It's all political stuff. It's like a, like a

hodgepodge of just random news. But then at night, I like to watch NBC Nightly News. And I like that... 'Cause it's, it kinda condenses like a lot of the, uh, heavy hitter stories in the one...

Moderator (00:35:26):

In 30 minutes.

G1: SN (00:35:26):

30 minutes. Yeah. Yeah. I like it.

Moderator (00:35:30):

Uh-huh. Mm-hmm. And headline news, is, is it station, right?

G1: SN (00:35:32):

Yeah.

Moderator (00:35:32):

That's a... Yeah. Uh, and when you watch, um, NBC Nightly News, what is it about that news that you particularly like?

G1: SN (00:35:41):

Uh, just the, the flow of it. Uh, the, it's... Uh, there's ABC and then there's NBC. And they're, they both kind of have the same stories. But then sometimes, like some of them have different takes on the stories, which I think is cool. Different interviews and different things like that.

Moderator (00:35:53):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SN (00:35:54):

Um, I so usually catch one of them, depending what time it is.

Moderator (00:35:57):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SN (00:35:58):

Uh, but, yeah, it's just really condensed, and it's gonna, it's only gonna be, be like big headlines, you know.

Moderator (00:36:03):

Right. Mm-hmm. Do you all watch local news at all?

G1: CN (00:36:06):

Yeah, in the morning.

G1: SE (00:36:07):

Mm.

G1: CN (00:36:07):

That's when I wake up... That's what I wake up to. And then I watched the dateline, uh, the-

G1: SN (00:36:10):

Headline?

G1: CN (00:36:11):

... The Headline with David Muir.

G1: SN (00:36:12):

Yeah, yeah, yeah, yeah.

G1: CN (00:36:12):

That's what I watch. And me because it's, like he says, it's condensed, condensed in 30 minutes, it's not that overload of an hour of them repeating the same thing and then get you depressed because of the war in Ukraine and what, you know, whatever's going on. But I do the

morning, I do the, you know, local news here every morning just to see. And that's just even deyou know, depressing will all the crime and all the shootings and... But I watch it, just make sure that [inaudible 00:36:36].

G1: M (00:36:38):

I, I try not to watch the local news.

Moderator (00:36:39):

You try not to watch the local news?

G1: M (00:36:39):

Not to watch the...

Moderator (00:36:39):

Why is that?

G1: M (00:36:39):

Depressing.

G1: SE (00:36:41):

Yeah, it's [inaudible 00:36:41].

G1: M (00:36:41):

There's always something happening around.

G1: CA (00:36:43):

It gives you anxiety.

G1: SE (00:36:44):

Yes. It really does. Like watching it makes me feel very uneasy.

Moderator (00:36:47):

Uh, what is it about that makes you...

G1: SE (00:36:48):

Just everything that's going on. And like crime in the area. I mean, right outside my neighborhood, somebody was shot at, like a few weeks ago at a convenience store. And I saw it on the news. And I was like, "I had no idea this happened."

G1: M (00:37:00):

So, so sometimes what happened like if you know, like you get more worried. But sometimes, if you don't know, you're just gonna go to the gas station.

G1: SE (00:37:07):

Yeah. I still... I mean, I still go but...

G1: M (00:37:10):

G1: SH, what were you saying? The [inaudible 00:37:11] news?

G1: SH (00:37:13):

Yeah. Um, I don't primarily watch the news. I just feel like they're too scripted for me. And it's not... Or it's not raw and uncut. So personally, for me, I follow social media sites that exposed... They'll do the research and expose what's really happening in the government. Yeah. There's one called more information, I'll follow them. And I'll follow like ATL Scoop. Um, I also have an app. I don't know if you all have it. But there's a neighborhood app that pings you when there's...

G1: SN (00:37:46):

Citizen?

G1: SH (00:37:46):

Yes. I utilize that, uh, app.

G1: CA (00:37:50): That one gives you... That one, that one will give you [inaudible 00:37:52]. G1: SE (00:37:52): I don't like that one. [inaudible 00:37:53]. G1: CN (00:37:54): That would give you anxiety. Moderator (00:37:55): It's called Neighborhood app or Citizen? G1: SN (00:37:56): Citizen. Moderator (00:37:56): It's called Citizen. G1: SN (00:37:56): Mm-hmm. Moderator (00:37:56): That's bad. G1: SH (00:38:01): So... And I guess it's, it's immune to me, 'cause in New York, everything is like it is what it is. So even being out here and having a son of diverse background, I have to be aware of what is going on at all times. And as far as the government and economy, I'll follow those other sites to be exposed to what's really happening even with, um, our finances and, you know, things of that nature. But I don't really watch the news. To be honest, if I do watch the news, it's New York news. It's not, it's not Atlanta news, so. Moderator (00:38:36): What about Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, talk to me a little about those. G1: SH (00:38:40): TikTok. G1: SN (00:38:40): TikTok. G1: SH (00:38:40): Yeah. Moderator (00:38:41): What about TikTok? G1: SN (00:38:42): It's click. It's right there. G1: SH (00:38:43): Very quick. G1: SN (00:38:43):

You can kinda like... It's in between other things you'd like to watch. So it gets your attention and boom, you can swipe up and go to next story or go to next Tik-

Moderator (00:38:52):

Do you, do you watch it for news though or you use it for entertaining?

G1: SN (00:38:53):

Oh, seek anything out on TikTok. I let it kind of populate what you, what are, what it kind of wants you, your, on your For You page. Where, where you think it'll, it'll kind of give you stuff that you might like. Then if you like it, it's gonna, it's gonna put that in the algorithm and then kinda give you stuff related to it.

Moderator (00:39:09):

Mm-hmm.

G1: SN (00:39:10):

It's really, it's really cool.

Moderator (00:39:11):

Do you get a lot of politics and that or is it just...

G1: SH (00:39:13):

There are some.

G1: SN (00:39:13):

Yeah.

G1: SH (00:39:13):

Exposing a lot. So...

G1: SN (00:39:13):

Oh, yeah.

G1: M (00:39:17):

I like to have good source, uh, where the news is coming from or generating.

Moderator (00:39:22):

Mm-hmm.

G1: M (00:39:22):

So I don't really care about random Facebook ads or, um, Instagram or Tiktok. I like more like New York Times and Wall Street. Something that's sore, something those are [inaudible 00:39:35] rather than research around the...

G1: SN (00:39:37):

I like New York Times too but they charge. I'm not paying.

G1: SE (00:39:40):

Well, a lot of the stuff that you see on social media kind of takes you back to those types of articles. Like it's not just someone making a post or whatever.

G1: SH (00:39:46):

Yeah. And they're not, they're not making up stuff. Like I've seen people solve crimes quicker on social media than the police. So I mean, like for me, that's where you get the... You know?

G1: SE (00:39:56):

Yeah. I like to...

G1: SN (00:39:56):

Mm-hmm.

Moderator (00:39:59):

You said what G1: CA?

G1: CA (00:39:59):

I get my news from, um, the app, Nextdoor.

G1: SH (00:40:01):

Yeah.

G1: CA (00:40:02):

Uh, Nextdoor app.

G1: SH (00:40:02):

Yeah. And I have that, too.

G1: CA (00:40:03):

Yeah, the Nextdoor because it's nosy neighbor.

G1: SH (00:40:12):

Yeah. [inaudible 00:40:13].

G1: CA (00:40:12):

It's nosy neighbors and literally you can, like, you know...

G1: CN (00:40:16):

You, you find out what's going... I mean, they're nosy, but it's good to know [inaudible 00:40:19].

G1: CA (00:40:18):

It's good to know if [inaudible 00:40:19].

G1: CN (00:40:19):

Like in my neighbor... Like I live in a pretty decent neighborhood. I've been there, uh, 10 years, and we only had one crime like in the actual subdivision. And last May, we had a situation. Somebody had a visitor, he didn't take his medications, went haywire, and started destroying people's property.

Moderator (00:40:34):

Oh, gosh.

G1: CN (00:40:35):

Um, and so we... The... You know, as part of the board, we had to address it. But, you know, because I'm Fulton, South Fulton, you're not you know, uh, we... The cops couldn't even come to us in time. So neighbors had to restrain him 'til the cops came. 'Cause Fulton came and said it was done. South Fulton came and said, "We think it's done it's us, we don't know." So it, it was like 45 minutes of chaos. But they're, it's a good, it's a... To me, it's a good app because you get to see... It's got a lot of craziness in there but...

G1: CA (00:41:02):

Yeah, there's a lot of, there's a lot of in-inequalities and discrimination on there.

G1: CN (00:41:07):

Yeah.

G1: CA (00:41:07):

Some opinions more heated than others. But I just close the discussion and just, you know, um...

G1: CN (00:41:13):

Yeah, I'd, I read and then I go there.

Moderator (00:41:14):

Uh, I wanna go back to what G1: SN talked about, about having to pay to get access to like New York Times. What the... Does that keep you all from accessing that news? What do you typically do?

G1: SE (00:41:22):

I don't pay for it.

G1: CN (00:41:23):

I don't pay for it. Moderator (00:41:23): You don't pay for it? G1: L (00:41:25): Oh, let me tell you what I do. Well, I had a neat little trick that I learned. G1: SN (00:41:29): That's what I [inaudible 00:41:30] so. G1: L (00:41:33): Let me, let me get you repeat the question so I make sure I answer it right. Moderator (00:41:35): No. Just go ahead. G1: L (00:41:36): Okay. So if you don't wanna pay... You're talking about paying for the news, right? Moderator (00:41:39): Mm-hmm. G1: L (00:41:40): Okay. You just... On an iPhone or Android, just copy and paste the title and it's exploring exactly... G1: M (00:41:48): There you go. That's what I do. That's what I do. That's what I do. G1: L (00:41:49): They give you a free copy of the same story. G1: M (00:41:52): That's what I do. G1: L (00:41:52): Yeah. I've been doing it for years. G1: M (00:41:54): So, so, so, so if I got a notification on my iPhone from Apple... I mean, for New York Times and [inaudible 00:42:01]. G1: CN (00:41:59): Nobody's paying \$10. G1: M (00:42:02): So I just google search the keywords and then it'll give me 10 sources for free and be seeing... G1: L (00:42:07): For the same article-G1: M (00:42:08): For the same article. G1: L (00:42:09): ... without paying \$10. G1: M (00:42:10): And that's the hack. G1: SN (00:42:11): But it's not the, it's not the actual New York Times article.

Uh, what about, uh, YouTube? Can you talk to me about YouTube a little bit? Um...

Acceptance. Yeah.

I think, I think this current, uh, climate, I think a lot of people are trying to play the victim. And it, it gets really annoying when you have a lot of people that feel like they should just get handouts in this country. And, and, and they don't wanna... Like all this PPP stuff. It's like that was a huge fraud and people are getting like arrested now, you know. They, they, they, they took advantage of this like real grassroots kinda system to, to help out employee, employees and employers. And, and they, and they just made a fraud of it. Helping out your neighbor. G1: SH, what do you think a good citizen does or doesn't do? G1: SH (00:53:40):

Um, I guess I'll speak on what doesn't do. Um, what do you mean like... I know, there's no right or wrong answers.

There's no right or wrong answers. Just what do you think our obligations are in the society? G1: SH (00:53:58):

I believe so. I've, I've enrolled... I've, I've done that. I've done where, um, I've taken like, um, as soon as I know that you're able to vote, "Let's go, um, get you signed up. Let's get you..." Moderator (00:55:12):

Mm-hmm.

G1: CA (00:55:12):

Um, that was the first thing I did when my son turned 18 and my niece turned... When... All of my family members, that was the first thing. I think I learned that at a young age because my mom was always... Um, my mom worked in grassroots. So I, I always saw that. I always saw my mom...

Um, it... I'll do my duty and go to jury duty, but I will always find a way to try to get out of it. I'm just being honest.

G1: M, what do you think about it? What do you think about jury duty?

Has that always been that way?

No, I think this was like a real, I think, I think it was like the biggest one. This is what started it Moderator (01:01:38):

Mm-hmm.

G1: L (01:01:40):

With Trump or Biden?

G1: SN (01:01:42):

With Biden.

G1: L (01:01:42):

Oh, yeah.

G1: SN (01:01:44):

Yeah. Well, and Trump.

G1: SE (01:01:44):

I think 2016.

G1: SN (01:01:44):

In 2016?

G1: CN (01:01:44): 2016, it started. G1: SN (01:01:44):

Yeah.

G1: SE (01:01:44):

Yeah.

G1: CN (01:01:48):

Yeah. That's when, that's when the circus started. Yeah. [inaudible 01:01:50]. We can, we, we cannot go to the circus.

Moderator (01:01:52):

Wait, one at a time, one at a time. G1: CN?

G1: CN (01:01:55):

I said I think that's when the circus started and we can't not not go to the circus 'cause we're living the circus. And so that's the way I kind of see it.

They're actually in office right now. Trump's not even in office. Like what are you looking for?

It's a distraction.

G1: SN (01:05:25):

Yeah.

G1: SH (01:05:26):

Okay. That's what I'm talking about, the distraction.

What's a dis-... It's a distraction from what?

G1: SH (01:05:32):

From Trump, Trump, Trump, No, no, no, no. Take care of what's going on with you people in there.

Nancy Pelosi over inside- insider trading. She... I mean, how did she have \$150 million?

G1: SH (01:05:44):

Some of those stocks.

G1: SN (01:05:45):

Real estate. I mean, it's so, it's just, it's like blatantly corrupt. And when, when she was asked the question, "Hey, do you think politicians are... Have you ever used insider trading" or like something about like trading stocks and should senators not be allowed in stocks, "Have you ever traded stock based on to..." She didnt answer the question. Kind of maneuver there.

Her and her husband.

Yeah. I mean, that's just slugging.

G1: CA (01:06:06):

Right. Take care of home and I'll worry about the war.

G1: SH (01:06:09):

That's the thing.

G1: CA (01:06:09):

I mean, our gas prices, I mean...

G1: SH (01:06:11):

Absolutely.

G1: CA (01:06:12):

It's, you know, [inaudible 01:06:14].

G1: SN (01:06:15):

No respect probably 'cause he don't even shake Nancy Pelosi's hand when he was like in office. It was like also the funny scene where she tried to shake his hand, he doesn't 'cause he knows how corrupt she is. As far as all her...

Moderator (01:06:25):

Do you think Trump is corrupt?selves

G1: SE (01:06:25):

Absolutely.

G1: CN (01:06:25):

They all are.

G1: SE (01:06:25):

I think they all are.

G1: SH (01:06:28):

[inaudible 01:06:28] but I, I'll tell you this much, I never liked him as a New Yorker but I love his truth, his honesty. He's not, he does not care. So keep talking 'cause I wanna know what's going on. Tell us the truth. You're not gonna hide it, tell us the truth just like you brought your paperwork home, dummy. It's like, it's like everybody is a scientist [inaudible 01:08:35] or everybody's a doctor. So like I don't have time to argue with people who don't have enough knowledge like me.

Okav. G1: M (01:08:41): So... But do you-Moderator (01:08:41): But I read it. G1: M (01:08:41): Mm-hmm. Moderator (01:08:41): And I get everything. G1: M (01:08:45): But do you engage, you exchange... Moderator (01:08:46): I'm never engaged, I will never engage. G1: M (01:08:48): Okay. You don't. Moderator (01:08:49): It's just waste of time. G1: SE (01:08:49): I don't ever read it. It pisses me off. G1: CN (01:08:52): Yeah. G1: SN (01:08:52): One, one... Uh, another thing I wanted, I wanted to get into as far as... I forgot to mention this, it's like when the whole Coronavirus is happening, they kept telling me, "Get the vaccine, get the vaccine." And then boom, everyone got the vaccine and boom, people are still getting Coronavirus. Moderator (01:09:03): Mm-hmm. G1: SN (01:09:03): And then boom. It's like, it's like, "Oh, now you need two shots." "Oh, you're gonna, you're gonna get Coronavirus. Even get the third shot." "Oh, 94 shots." Moderator (01:09:10): Mm-hmm. Vaccine, it's not a cure. Vaccine is, uh, prevention. If you know healthcare or you have any educational background in healthcare or you have family in healthcare, vaccine is to prevention. It's not a cure. Like there is no cure for certain disease. Coronavirus, they don't have a cure, like-

Yeah. But, you know, if you get your MMR vaccine, that's a vaccine. You get the polio vaccine, that's a vaccine.

But it's, it

G1: SH (01:10:01):

But you notice they didn't, they, they didn't tell the people that.

But it will help... People need to educate themselves.

They wanted more. [inaudible 01:10:06]

Moderator (01:10:06):

Yeah. All right. I'm gonna, I'm gonna stop there, 'cause I really wanna go back to this stuff here, guys. So make sure you write down your stuff. Thank you for that very lively discussion. I appreciate that. But I wanna talk a little bit about, you know, the rights of things when you think... What's the first thing comes to mind when you put Democratic Party? And what's the first thing that comes to mind when you think of the Republican Party? More liberal? Okay. And when, when you say liberal, what does that mean to you? What is liberal?

G1: M (01:11:01):

I mean, they take everybody's right into consideration. Not... They don't mix, I think, religion with politics.

Moderator (01:11:09):

Mm-hmm.

G1: M (01:11:09):

So I think they're more like liberal in terms of like say abortion, gay rights, all the like human, uh, rights, I would say.

Moderator (01:11:16):

Mm-hmm.

G1: M (01:11:17):

Uh, they're not smart in business or, you know, taking care of the economy, I would say.

Moderator (01:11:22):

Mm-hmm.

G1: M (01:11:22):

But in other like social, uh, justice, or, you know, like them, uh, slightly more, better educated than the other one.

Moderator (01:11:29):

Mm-hmm. And what makes you say they're not good at business? Because...

G1: M (01:11:32):

Uh, I think they, they don't, they lack the business, uh, you know, side where, um, they're not bithey're not entrepreneurs, I think so, uh, in, in terms of like the, the party itself. I mean, you know, um, I think the other party is more built with entrepreneurs or like backed by it, uh, more entrepreneurial.

Moderator (01:11:50):

Okay, G1: CA, what did you write on the Democratic Party?

G1: CA (01:11:52):

I wrote rights, liberal, um, pro bono.

Moderator (01:11:56):

Pro bono. What does... And what does liberal mean to you?

G1: CA (01:11:59):

Um, someone, as G1: M was saying, um, as far as their, like, um, their stance on abortion, um, their stance on, uh, gun reform, their stance on immigration. Um, they, they know what they want for those particular subjects.

Moderator (01:12:20):

Do, do you think they've kept their promise on immigration?

G1: CA (01:12:23):

No.

Moderator (01:12:24):

Okay. Okay. Um, G1: SE, what did you write into Democratic Party?

G1: SE (01:12:29):

I wrote, um, inclusive, but also telling you what you wanna hear so it's only a dream, and then also corrupt and, um, quite liberal.

Moderator (01:12:37):

Mm-hmm. And when you say liberal, what does that mean to you?

G1: SE (01:12:39):

Um, just... I feel like the, the... For example, the Republican Party, to me, they're stuck in like the older ways. And then the Democrat Party is the more, um, times are changing and the, the more just falling, going with times and, um, human rights. Like one of the things, abortion, um, the gun

Well, everything as a person. Just as a human. You know what I mean? You... When I was younger, you know, my mom would talk about, you know, you know, the elections and stuff, but she was... My dad always never voted on it. But my mom would say, "Hey, you know, we, we did this and we're doing that." But now I feel like it's, it's just not there. It's like, it's, I, I can't even explain this, like they're not... They're in Washington and they're in their own little bubble, and everybody else is in this other bubble. Broken promises, Jeffrey Epstein and the Clintons.

Okay. And what, why don't you put Jeffrey Epstein?

I just feel like there's something that we don't know that was going on between Epstein, the Clintons.

What, what did you put under Republican? Let's go... G1: SH, what did you write at the Republican?

G1: SH (01:17:21):

I said money hungry, pest control, just counter and flip thing, placed a lot of restrictions, aggressive, extremely old and wealthy. Stingy, keep the rich richer and the poor poorer.

Moderator (01:17:33):

Okay. G1: M, what did you write?

G1: M (01:17:36):

Conservative, traditional.

Moderator (01:17:37):

Conservative and traditional. And what does conservative mean to you?

G1: M (01:17:40):

Old ideas.

Moderator (01:17:40):

Old ideas?

G1: M (01:17:40):

Stuck in, stuck in old ideas. I don't know. More traditional.

Moderator (01:17:40):

Cristina?

G1: CA (01:17:47):

Constraints. Constraints.

Moderator (01:17:50):

Constraints?

G1: CA (01:17:51):

Mm-hmm.

Moderator (01:17:51):

Okay.

G1: CA (01:17:52):

Mm-hmm.

Moderator (01:17:52):

That's what you wrote down?

G1: CA (01:17:53):

Constraints.

Moderator (01:17:53):

Okay, constraints. Anything else?

G1: CA (01:17:55):

Let's talk illegal. Like, uh, some of the things that they, um, some of the things that they do, I just find that it's not the right legal way to do things.

Okay. G1: SE, what did you write down?

G1: SE (01:18:10):

Um, selfish, money hungry, uh, corrupt, and just old, stuck in the old, old ways.

Old ways.

G1: SE (01:18:16):

And then, um, I also put race- racist on here.

Moderator (01:18:19):

You put racist?

G1: SE (01:18:20):

Yeah.

Okay. Uh, G1: CN, what did you put?

G1: CN (01:18:24):

Again, uh, non-realistic, tax evader, Trump craziness and old ways.

And old ways? G1: SN, what did you put?

G1: SN (01:18:31):

It just put telling it as it is, no fluff, right to the point or even, even if it hurts, it's gonna... they're gonna say it. That's it.

Uh, like, like somebody said in the group already, just sticking to the, uh, old ways of doing things very traditional.

Moderator (01:19:04):

Mm-hmm. So are the parties, are they doing anything to kind of handle the situation of rising costs and inflation right now? Do you see them doing anything to, to address the issue of raising costs?

G1: SN (01:19:15):

They're just putting each other down.

Moderator (01:19:17):

They're just putting each other down?

G1: SH (01:19:18):

[inaudible 01:19:18] their focus in the Ukraine.

G1: SN (01:19:22):

I think it's more of the corporations that are mitigating that.

G1: M (01:19:23):

Corporations or control represent by lobbyists or lobbyists. Like a... In the end, I mean, corporation only do things when there are laws that allow them to do those.

Moderator (01:19:36):

G1: SE, were you gonna say something?

G1: SE (01:19:38):

I just, uh, I just find it... I laugh every time I hear somebody say, "Oh, you know, screw Biden 'cause of these gas prices." I'm like, "I don't think Biden's like in charge or in control of the gas price."

G1: SN (01:19:49):

Well, it's kinda he close the pipeline so yes, he is a lot in control of our gas prices going up.

G1: SE (01:19:54):

Okay.

Moderator (01:19:55):

Atlanta, it's like Fulton County. It's like downtown Atlanta.

G2: S (00:23:55):

And Georgia used to be the like epitome of everyone needs to come and run down here and about like, "Oh, man, you can get, you know, quality housing or quality living without, um, you know, without the, um, what about the, the costs? Like you can get decent housing and..."

The cost of living in do- down here.

G2: S (00:24:19):

It, i- yeah, and, and now, it's, it's changing like over the last 5, 10 years. It's definitely changed, even the, even within the last five years that I've been here, like I, I had an apartment over in the perimeter area and that one bedroom that I had at that time was like between 12 and 13, which was still kinda high but between 12 and 1300, but now, that's same apartment is like 2200.

Like, I see a lot of homelessness here in Atlanta, I don't know how it is, like, in the surrounding areas, but there's a lot of homelessness. I've been to Charlotte too, and it was a pretty, like, big problem, but not as big as here.

Is there one that you-G2: J (00:39:31): Oh, I'd say, um, probably YouTube more. Moderator (00:39:32): Mm-hmm.

G2: J (00:39:32):

Because, like, as long as, you know, like, no extremes-

G2: J (00:39:35):

... 'cause there's, like, such a extremes, extremes on one side, I just really don't try to, kinda just don't try to listen to it, find someone else. I have more, I have a choice type thing.

Like, he was saying, they have an agenda. I don't know, I feel like when you only talk about your version of the story it makes those people angry towards whatever they're talking about towards.

And it just, all I think it does is with those agendas, it just creates division.

G2: I (00:41:45):

You polarize people.

G2: S (00:41:47):

'Cause you're already divided, so it just keeps everyone di- you know, separated, and just creates this whole division thing, 'cause god forbid if everyone came together in unity (laughs). Moderator (00:42:02):

W- when y'all are on social media, do you ever comment or repost political things, or you just read it with... How do you interact with political content on social media? What are you doing?

G2: S (00:42:13):

I mainly read it.

G2: R (00:42:14):

Yeah.

G2: S (00:42:16):

Yeah. I'm not-

G2: R (00:42:17):

If I'm aligned to something, uh, I will post it, and even if I'm not aligned with something, I will, I post it and try to, you know, break it down-

Moderator (00:42:27):

Mm-hmm.

G2: R (00:42:28):

... you know, give my perspective on it, you know, just as an exercise to, you know, communicate, you know, what you see from your perspective of it.

Mm-hmm. G2: I, what about you? Do you interact with the content, or you just read it, and listen to it?

G2: I (00:42:42):

I do interact, I don't necessarily comment on it, but I do repost things. Um, I come from a political science background, that's what I did for college, so, I mean, I usually post it, like, on Facebook with both Spanish and English, so just so people can read it if, if they find it interesting. I always find that, like, like if they wanna read it, they can, they don't necessarily have to agree with me or anything, just an interesting read.

When, when y'all see political content, like a news article, or that's written versus a video, what, what, what do you find more trustworthy? Do you think, like, the videos are better, do you think the, do you think the text is better? What re- i- just kinda talk to me a little bit about sort or content that you all consume on social media video versus text.

I think the video is more impactful because more people are visually stimulated more so than, you know, reading comprehension.

I think the reading is down because, uh, you know, educationally wise, they really don't push for, uh, reading comprehension that much these days, so a lot of people are used to being told, instead of reading about the news.

... but not physically.

G2: R (00:44:40):

Physical paper.

Like, the actual physical newspaper thing, it's-

Uh, Jeff Bezos, o-Amazon, they pay nearly nothing, you probably pay more taxes than they do, and they're probably more productive to the overall society than you are. So there's something to that whole, you know, pay taxes, because it seems like the people who pay the most taxes are the more exploited people.

So it's just a lot of things that plays a part. And I'm like, "I don't even..." I live here but I'm- no, I'm not registered.

Locations, that were already set up. Something about even with the Count?

Mm-hmm. G2: S (00:56:17): I believe was completely off- like she won that. G2: J (00:56:21): Voter suppression. Moderator (00:56:22): Voter suppression. G2: S (00:56:23): Yeah, she... she won that. Moderator (00:56:27): G2: J, what about you? Have you... you're not registered now so have you ever been asked to vote or? G2: J (00:56:34): No, I have not. Before I even qualified? Before I have been asked that but I wasn't qualified then. Moderator (00:56:38): Okay. G2: J (00:56:38): I'm trying to register November at least to get more input. To get more into it- the politics. Moderator (00:56:45): Mm-hmm. G2: J (00:56:45): And to see how it goes. G2: S (00:56:50): But you haven't registered so far right? G2: J (00:56:52): Moderator (00:56:52): What's kept you from registering? G2: J (00:56:54): I'm just waiting to the last minute to the next presidential vote. Moderator (00:56:59): You're just waiting for the next presidential? G2: J (00:57:00): Yeah. Moderator (00:57:00): Okay. But is there any reason that's keeping you or are you just busy with? I mean, what's happening. G2: J (00:57:06): Not, not really. I couldn't say. Moderator (00:57:06):

Mm-hmm.

G2: J (00:57:06):

I just get distracted, most days, from it.

Moderator (00:57:15):

You just get distracted is what you said. That's what you said.

G2: J (00:57:18):

Yes.

Moderator (00:57:19):

Oh okay. Just wanted to make sure.

Moderator (00:57:21):

Itsy, tell me about you. Are you currently registered to vote? What's... what's you're situation.

G2: I (00:57:26):

So I was registered to vote in North Carolina. So when I moved here... I think I'm registered to vote in North Carolina, just not in Georgia.

Moderator (00:57:34):

Mm-hmm.

G2: I (00:57:34):

Yeah.

Moderator (00:57:34):

And do you plan on registering to vote? It is this something you're not interested in anymore? Are you - are you like G2: S, and you're just... you're done or do you think you still want to stay involved?

Moderator (00:57:42):

Talk to me a little bit about what where you are.

G2: I (00:57:44):

Yeah, I'm definitely going to stay involved. Just... I need the get my ducks in a row before I do. I guess.

Moderator (00:57:51):

What do you mean?

G2: I (00:57:53):

Just like, you know, moving to a whole new city with nobody here. You kind of just want to settle in and then I'll deal with the political side of Georgia. (laughs)

G2: I (00:58:02):

It's a mess. Sorry I just want to be more informed. I don't want to just go out there and vote, you know? I want to be more informed about their laws, their policies, you know?

Moderator (00:58:11):

Mm-hmm.

G2: I (00:58:12):

Who's in my district? Everything.

Moderator (00:58:13):

So you don't feel that you know enough to be able to participate at this time?

G2: I (00:58:17):

Yeah. That's correct.

Moderator (00:58:17):

Do you have a plan? Do you kind of see yourself doing that in the next 3 months? Three years? Kind of... what kind of plan have you laid out for yourself?

G2: I (00:58:26):

I would say within the next year.

Moderator (00:58:28):

Mm-hmm.

G2: I (00:58:28):

Just you know, it's a lot. Politics is a lot and you should take it more seriously.

Moderator (00:58:34):

Mm-hmm, mm-hmm.

But do you feel like your vote would matter if you were to register vote and vote?

I would like to think that it matters.

Moderator (00:59:02):

G2: R, what about you? You're currently not registered to vote, what's going on with you?

G2: R (00:59:06):

Like, mostly everybody else- uh. I'm transplanted here so um... moving from [inaudible 00:59:13]Alabama to here. Been here for the last 8 years, um. I just never got around to getting that involved in politics.

G2: R (00:59:28):

And I think the more you understand about the political process, the more you're empowered. Uh, I think... what's more important than voting is being able to be like the Asian community. The Asian community has the lowest turnout when it comes to voting but they tend to control their communities that they, uh, reside in or that they have business in. Because, you know, the money that they contribute. So, uh, I happen to stay in Cobb county where uh the predominant

people there, their political views on being more conservative tend to reflect what I believe in. So it's in a good position right now to stay that way.

Look, i don't want to put words in your mouth but so what I think I'm hearing you saying is that money matters more than your vote.

G2: R (01:00:38):

Right.

Moderator (01:00:39):

Is that what I'm hearing you're saying?

G2: R (01:00:40):

Yeah, I think the check, uh, matters more to contributing to the matters of your community; more so than voting.

Moderator (01:00:44):

Have you always felt this way or is it something that you've just recently felt?

G2: R (01:00:52):

Uh, just examining the whole political process. I know that, uh, for instance, you know. Uh, I'm Latino and African American and I know in the African American community, we've always had the highest turnout in voting. And I think G2: S here just gave you a perfect example, uh. Of, uh, the African American community turning out and couldn't... under Biden's administration, just by Stacey Abrams helping him win the vote. The, uh, liberal party vote. Uh, and helping deliver the Biden administration to the office back yet.

I've seen them put the Asian community with uh...what is it called? The hate crime reel out. Moderator (01:01:47):

I've seen them take care of the immigration issue at the border. And, um, the Ukraine and everybody else came way before, I think, the African American community might have gotten a holiday. A Juneteenth holiday out of this whole thing. And that wasn't anything of substance, uh. So, I contribute that to understanding politics more so than... I think an educated voter is more important than a voter.

So even though you all don't vote. Do you pay attention to any of the elections? I mean, it sounds to me like you're paying attention, right G2: S?
